Junior Williams had the misfortune of falling out of a tree and on a barbed wire fence, lacerating his leg so that it was necessary to have seven stitches taken Friday.

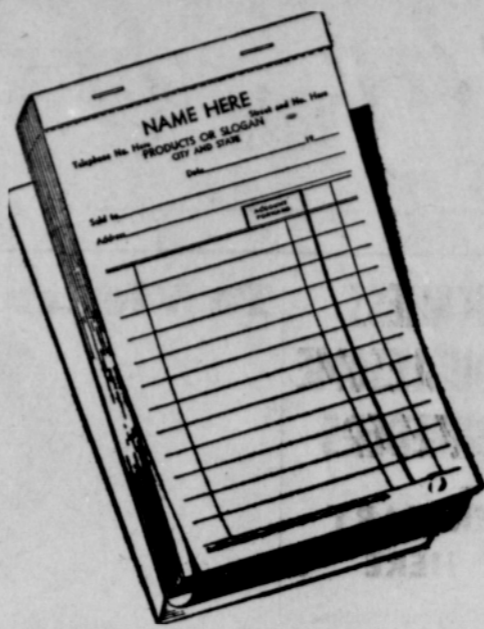
