AAA BENEFIT RATES ARE REDUCED 10%

Because of the unexpectedly large participation of the nation's farmers in the 1940 agricultural and range conservation programs, federal payments will be 10 per cent lower than the tentative rates announced last November, N. C. Donaldson, in charge of the state AAA office in Corvallis, has been informed.

This downward adjustment is necessary in order that payments will not exceed funds appropriated by congress, says Donaldson.

This means that checks issued to Oregon farmers for participation in all phases of the 1940 AAA program, with the exception of the price adjustment program and sugar beet program, will be 90 per cent of the tentative schedule announced previously.
