TOWNSEND CLUB NEWS

A very important meeting will be held at the Legion hall Friday, August 9, at 8:30 p. m. All members are requested to be present and the public is always invited.

The dance committee is making plans for another benefit dance at the Columbia park hall with the date to be announced later. The money made from these dances is being put into funds that will help enact our bill as a law.

Following is part of the highlight speech of Robert Townsend, son of Dr. Townsend, which was given in seven different towns in Oregon during the week of July 22:

"We are the richest nation in the world. Have the most natural resources. We have the finest people in the world and in spite of that, one-third of us are today ill-fed, ill-housed and ill-clothed. Every family should have at least \$200.00 per month to live properly. This would be a problem if we didn't have it to give, but we have.

"We can put our country anywhere that we want. Shall we wait until we are actually threatened, or shall we make the change now? In order that our government can come to us and get enough taxes to build the largest navy and the biggest airports in the world? It isn't right that two-thirds of the population of our country support all the rest of the people. Our tax systems today are wrong. The Townsend Plan is a modern 1940 tax system.

"Eighty-two per cent of the wealth of the United States is east of the Mississippi river which is as it should be as most of our population as well as manufacturing centers are east of the Mississippi river. We have just as much money as ever, the only thing is, it isn't out circulating. This is no time for fooling around in this country. If each member would sell just one more person on the Townsend plan between now and the next election, there would be enough members to put it through. Some say this plan won't work. We believe it will. We can't see why it won't. Allow it to stand on its own feet. Then, if it can't stand, get rid of it.

"Let us forget whether we are Democrats, Republicans, Socialists, or what, and get together for the common cause. Vote for those who have the interest of America at heart, be they Democrat, Republican, or what. "This country is worth saving today or it isn't worth saving at all. "Let us not fail in our duty as Americans."

NEW BUTTER AND CHEESE PROGRAM OUTLINED BY OSC

A proposed new program for the future development of the butter and cheese industry in Oregon is contained in a new extension bulletin, No. 541, issued at Oregon State college, and entitled "Marketing Oregon Butter and Cheese." This bulletin is written by G. H. Wilster, professor of dairy manufacturing, and Paul Carpenter, extension marketing specialist, and includes a summary history of butter and cheese quality improvement and marketing progress during the past decade.

Ten points are included in the proposed future program, which is jointly recommended by the departments of agricultural economics and dairy husbandry. These ten points include the following items, given here in considerably abbreviated form.

1. Continuation of high-quality production, and the compulsory system of milk and cream grading.
2. Continued service to producers through research plus extension teaching.
3. Develop efficient and economical methods of cooling, storing, and transporting milk and cream.
4. Through research and education, continue to improve methods and practices in creameries and cheese factories.
5. Through research in factories and laboratories, correct the most serious defects that develop in butter and cheese.
6. Encourage greater standardization in the composition of butter and cheese.
7. Cooperate with state and federal agencies in standardizing butter and cheese grades.
8. Through field educational work improve efficiency in handling equipment and products so as to reduce undesirable bacteria and eliminate yeasts and moulds.
9. Develop better methods of packaging and curing cheese, to meet consumer demands.
10. Cooperate with the state department of agriculture in raising standards of proficiency for butter and cheese makers.

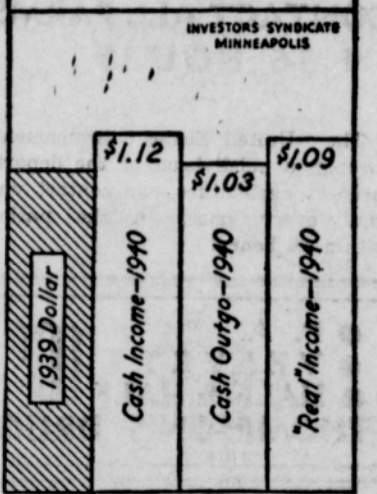

American Income Rises 9 Cents; Living Costs Up 3 Cents Over Year Ago

PURCHASING POWER JUNE, 1940, Compared with JUNE, 1939



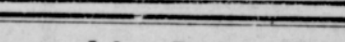
THE above chart, showing how the average American fared in national income changes in the last twelve months, is based on the monthly consumers' study of Investors Syndicate of Minneapolis.

Mr. and Mrs. Public in June had a "real income" of \$1.09, or an increase of nine cents on the dollar over the same 1939 month. This "real income" is not a subtraction of cash income and expenditures, but an average relative of these figures designed to show how living costs affect adjusted income dollars. Cash income of Mr. and Mrs. Public in June was \$1.12 for every \$1 a year earlier. This gain of twelve cents on the dollar resulted from the following changes per dollar: wages up thirteen cents and salaries six cents; investment income was up fifteen cents and other income was up six cents on the dollar.

Rents in June were up one cent from a year ago, but clothing was up two cents. Foods were five cents higher and miscellaneous items were up two cents making living expenses up a total of three cents.

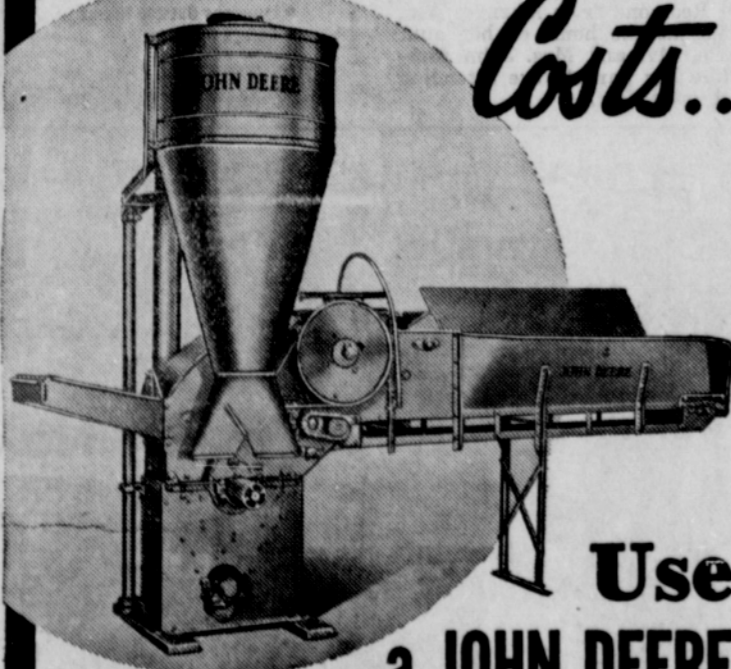

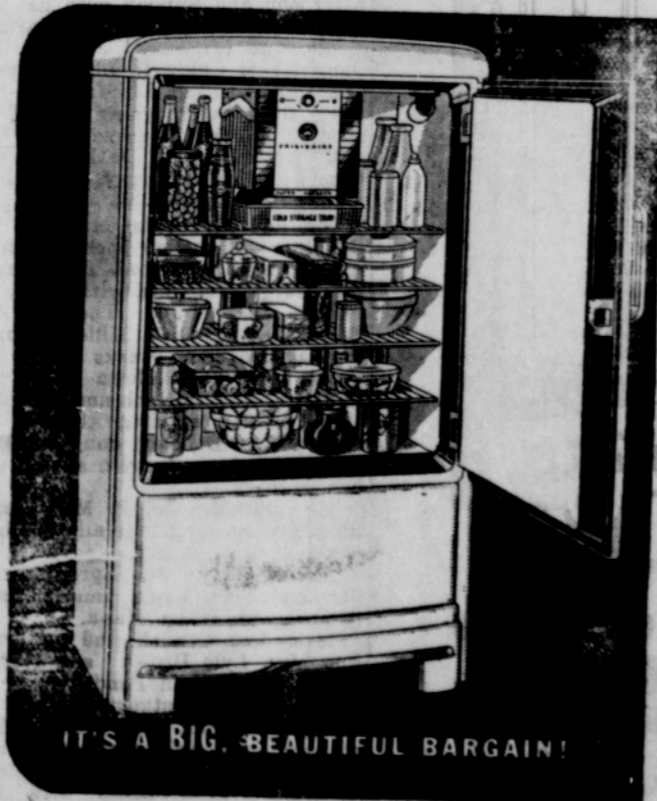
