DUCK HUNTING SEASON EXTENDED BY SECRETARY ICKES

SHOOTING DAY ALSO LENGTHENED

Secretary Ickes at Washington, D. C., announces that the hunting season for ducks, geese, coots and jacksnipe had been extended to 60 days this year from the 45-day limit of last season.

Announcing the annual regulations for shooting migratory waterfowl, the secretary said the extension was made possible by an increase in the population of these birds.

The regulations also lengthened the hunting day. Shooting may start at sunrise and continue until 4 p. m. for waterfowl and coot. Last year the hours were 7 a. m. to 4 p. m. Jacksnipe may be hunted from sunrise to sunset.

The bag limit on ducks remains at 10 a day.

Shorter seasons were provided, however, for woodcocks, and the bag limit for geese was reduced from 4 to 3 a day.

Shooting season on ducks, geese, coots and jacksnipe are:

Northern zone from October 1 to November 19; the intermediate zone, October 16 to December 14; the southern zone from November 2 to December 31.

As in previous years, the number of waterfowl that may be possessed at any time is limited to two days' bag but a new rule makes it possible to possess the legal limit for 20 days after the close of the season instead of 10 days.

The bag of canvas backs, redheads, bufflehead and ruddy ducks is limited to 3 a day, of any one of these species.
