Very truly and cordially yours, Chas. L. McNary, Congressman."

Pierce's letter to Mrs. Edna Udey: "Well, the Townsend clubs drew aces when they drew that letter from Charlie McNary which appeared on the front page of the Townsend weekly. That is a wonderful victory and it will have a sweeping effect." Townsendsites are very much encouraged.
