### ORDINANCE NO. 188

AN ORDINANCE FIXING REGULATIONS UPON THE USE OF BICYCLES IN THE CITY OF HERMISTON, PROVIDING A PENALTY AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

THE CITY OF HERMISTON DOES

ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. No person shall ride or operate any bicycle upon any street, alley or public place within the City of Hermiston during the period from a half hour after sunset until a half hour before sunrise, without having a lighted lamp affixed to the front of said bicycle, visible under normal atmospheric conditions from a distance of at least 300 feet in front of said bicycle, and also a reflex mirror or lighted lamp on the rear of said bicycle exhibiting a red light visible under like conditions from a distance of at least 200 feet to the rear of said bicycle.

Section 2. No person shall operate or ride any bicycle upon the streets, alleys or public places of the City of Hermiston with two or more persons upon the same bicycle, provided that this restriction shall not apply to bicycles equipped for two or more riders, and no person shall ride or operate a bicycle with the passenger in front of the rider or operator.

Section 3. No person while riding or operating a bicycle upon any street, alley or public place in the City of Hermiston shall hold on to any other vehicle.

Section 4. No person shall ride or operate any bicycle upon any sidewalk on Main Street between First and Third Streets.

Section 5. Every person riding or

operating a bicycle on any street, alley or public place in the City of Hermiston shall keep said bicycle on the extreme right of the traffic lane, and it shall be unlawful for two or more riders or operators of bicycles to travel abreast or to ride or operate a bicycle otherwise than in single file.

Section 6. It shall be unlawful to engage in bicycle racing upon the streets or alleys of the City of Hermiston.

Section 7. No operator or owner of a bicycle shall leave his bicycle on any sidewalk in the City of Hermiston or placed in such a manner as to hinder or impede pedestrian or vehicular traffic.

Section 8. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof before the City Recorder, be punished by impounding his bicycle in the office of the City Recorder for such period as the City Recorder shall designate.

Section 9. Every person riding or operating a bicycle upon any street, alley or public place in the City of Hermiston shall be subject to all the provisions of the laws of the State of Oregon and ordinances of the City applicable to the drivers of vehicles.

Section 10. Whereas bicycles are now being operated in the City of Hermiston without sufficient regulation, endangering the riders and other persons it is necessary that this ordinance be in effect immediately for the preservation of the peace, health and safety of the City, this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Council and approval by the Mayor.

Passed the Council this 4 day of September, 1940, by the affirmative vote of five Councilmen.
