ment that two years' tests do not support the claim that it is a true perennial. The experience of the bureau coincided closely with that of the Oregon experiment station. After careful study the BPI has now taken the position that the so-called Michels' grass should be considered as a variety of rye. Under a recent ruling of the Agricultural Marketing service, in connection with the federal seed act, it must be labeled rye when moved in interstate commerce. Indications are that this variety compares favorably with some other rye varieties in its growth, and it may be used for hay, pasture, or grain, but there is apparently no justification for paying a high price for the seed, Hyslop added.
