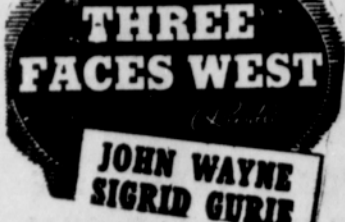

POWER COMPANY TO TEST METERS

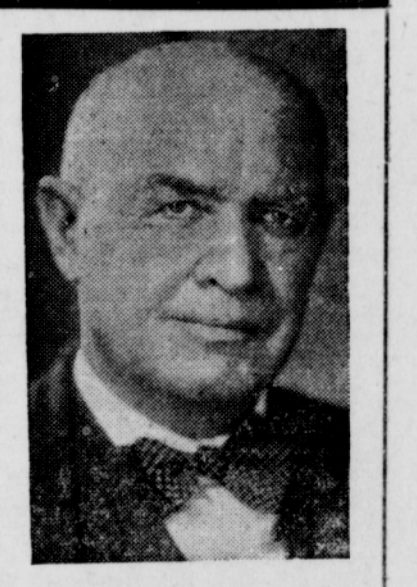

store, shop or other place where a meter is in service, identify himself and explain in detail the purpose of his call, answering any questions the customer may have about the operation.

In making the accuracy test, the "standard" is hooked up to the service meter so that current passing through the meter also registers on the standard. Any discrepancy is immediately apparent and can be corrected usually by simple adjustments. Any meter which cannot be

adjusted in the field is automatically replaced and sent to Walla Walla for repair.

Complete records are kept of all meters on the company's entire system. Every time a meter is removed from service for any reason, the jeweled bearing and steel pivot are replaced and sent to the Walla Walla service shop where microscopic examination reveals any flaws or worn spots which might affect accurate operation of the meter. Faulty parts are discarded.
