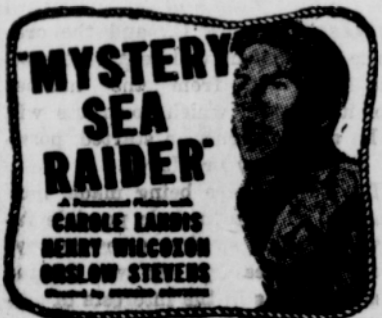

## OREGON WOOL GROWERS TO GATHER

Hot on the trail of current issues affecting their industry, wool growers from Oregon's far flung ranches and ranges will soon be trailing into Lakeview for the 44th yearly meeting of the state wool growers' association, on December 1, 2 and 3.

"Interest in the convention is keen," says Mac Hoke of Pendleton, President of the state association, who goes on to add that the southeastern Oregon livestock metropolis is all set for a big time, silk socks to be under a complete ban. Beginning shortly afternoon on December 1 the six major committees making up that phase of convention activity will get underway.
