4,192 HUNTERS GET 2,273 ELK IN 1940

Nimrods who took part in the 1940 elk hunt bagged a total of 2,273 elk, of which 1,127 were bull elk and 1,146 were cow elk. A total of 4,192 hunters checked in and out of the various checking stations conducted by the Oregon State Game Commission.

According to reports received by Frank B. Wire from the checking stations, the elk were in far better shape than in the past. The large increase in the bull kill was throughout the elk area and not concentrated in one section.

In 1939 a total number of 2,022 hunters bagged 842 bulls and 379 cows.

AAA ELECTIONS SET FOR WEEK OF DECEMBER 16 TO 21

The election of community committeemen under the agricultural conservation program will take place the week of December 16 to 21 in this and all other counties in Oregon, according to word received from the state AAA office.

Each community in the county will elect a community chairman, a vice-chairman, one regular and two alternate members, and a delegate to the county convention, at which county committeemen will be chosen the following week. All farmers who participate in the AAA farm program, or who intend to participate in 1941, are eligible to vote in the election.

County committeemen will be on hand to discuss the program at each of the community meetings, and will help with the elections. The community committeemen fill important positions in the local AAA setup as they recommend acreage allotments and establish yields for major crops. They also report proposed improvements of the farm program each year to keep it in line with needs of cooperating farmers.

MISS MULLINS IS AWARD WINNER

Oregon State College—Geraldine Mullins of Hermiston, sophomore in secretarial science, was one of the 84 sophomores receiving Phi Kappa Phi freshman honor awards recently at Oregon State college.

The Oregon State chapter of Phi Kappa Phi, national all-school scholastic honor society, each year grants certificates of awards in recognition of excellent scholastic records during the freshman year. This distinction is given to students who were enrolled in a regular freshman course, and have completed 45 term hours or more, with a grade point of 3.25 or higher, without a failure. This grade point is slightly above a "B".

Phi Kappa Phi is the only all-campus honor society recognizing high achievement of both men and women in any division of the institution.

Honorable James W. Mott, representative in Congress from the first Oregon district, was speaker at the convocation in which the awards were presented.
