R. J. RUEBER OF STANFIELD PASSES

Robert John Rueber, farmer, 51, passed away at his home in Stanfield Thursday noon of heart disease. He was the son of John Rueber and his wife Christiana (nee Schwarz) and was born in Germany February 9, 1881.

At the age of two years he emigrated with his parents to America and settled at Albany, Wis. Two years later the family moved to Maynard, Iowa, where he received his education and grew to manhood. In 1908 Mr. Rueber decided to come west, where he engaged in farming. For the last ten years he has lived at Stanfield. For several years he held the office of director of irrigation. Mr. Rueber had been in failing health for some time, but his death was nevertheless sudden.

He leaves to mourn his departure seven brothers and one sister. The brothers are Rev. August Rueber of Mapleton, Iowa, Charles and Gus of Maynard, Iowa, Martin of Portland, Oregon, and John, Jacob and Albert of Stanfield. The sister is Mrs. Julia Bender of Chicago, Ill. Besides these he leaves many other relatives and a host of friends both in Stanfield and in Iowa.

The departed was a life-long member of the Lutheran church and at his death was a faithful member at Pendleton.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock from Peace Lutheran church, the Rev. E. M. Butenshon officiating. Burial was in Olney cemetery.

BEAL DISPOSES OF BLACKSMITH SHOP

H. J. Beal, who has owned and operated Beal's Blacksmith Shop for the past several years, completed arrangements Saturday whereby James Jordon of Walla Walla, Wn., takes over the interests of the building and the Beal residence west of town. Mr. Jordon began work Monday but was taken ill and is now at his home in Walla Walla.

Construction of an 18x24 addition onto the present building is now underway and will house the woodworking machines. Mr. Beal will remain with the business for a year in the employ of Mr. Jordon. Mr. Beal will handle the farmers' work while Mr. Jordon will concentrate in the construction of the Klages Land Leveler machine.

LOCAL CREAMERY ISSUES DIVIDENDS

The Umatilla Cooperative Creamery of Hermiston declared a 1 1/2c dividend to patrons at a board meeting held recently, according to Monte Hedwall, manager. The dividends will be paid for the business of the first six months of 1940.

The creamery has steadily increased in growth and the present dividend will be the largest ever paid here, due mostly to the increase in business. During the first six months of the present year, an increase of 16,000 pounds of butter was made. The creamery handled 258,000 lbs. of butterfat during this period.

CO. HEALTH OFFICER ENDORSES SEAL SALE

Dr. W. H. Wilcox, county health officer, this week endorsed the 1940 tuberculosis Christmas Seal Sale of the Umatilla County Health association, opening December 1, as follows:

"Tuberculosis with its peculiar ability to undermine the health of victims and spread germs to others before any outward sign of its presence can be seen, is a difficult disease to control. Our medical profession has always endorsed the efforts of lay workers to carry the educational program to every man, woman and child in the country. These physicians realize that more can be accomplished in controlling the disease if those same men, women and

children know of tuberculosis and its incipient method of attack.

"In Umatilla county we have a year-round program for tuberculosis prevention. Investigations are assured in every home where tuberculosis is reported or suspected and a thorough check is made with the aid of the medical profession in determining whether or not the disease exists.

"Seal sale money from last year has made wide-spread testing and examination possible. I believe that every purchaser of Christmas Seals should follow the progress of tuberculosis control in Umatilla county in order to see for himself that his money actually takes part in preventing some person right here in our own community from having tuberculosis."

Money from the sale of Christmas seals if not sent to the county office may be left locally with either Mrs. Tom Fraser or Mrs. W. Martin Marbut.
