Miss Joan Leslie, teacher of the local school, was ill with the flu.

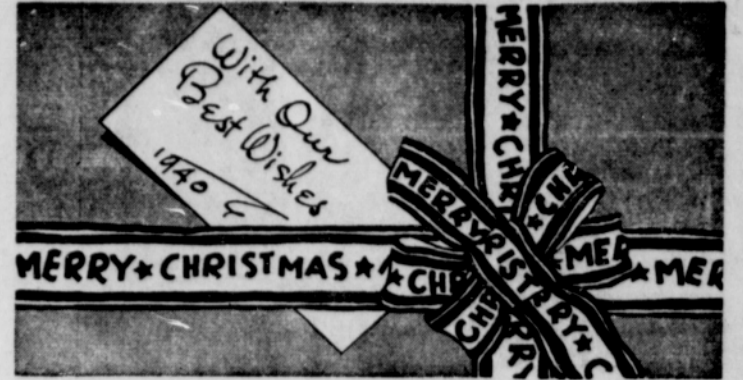
