O. L. BABCOCK DIES AT SALEM

Salem—Representative O. L. Babcock of Umatilla county collapsed and died Wednesday afternoon in the lobby of the Salem postoffice.

He was a new member of the house from Umatilla county, 66 years old, and a republican.

Major Babcock served many years in government positions, chiefly in the United States Indian service, before his retirement.

He was superintendent of the Umatilla Indian reservation when he reached the retirement age and settled in Pendleton. He was elected without opposition in his district.

The legislative vacancy will be filled by the Umatilla county court when the secretary of state calls for a meeting. His successor must be a republican.

The vacancy will be the third to be filled in the house this session.
