DATE CAKE
Serve One Tonight

1 cup Carnation Milk
1 tsp. vinegar
1 1/2 cups flour
1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. cloves
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup fat (half butter)
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1 lb. dates, sliced
1 cup nuts

Add vinegar to Carnation Milk. Sift flour, then measure. Resift with other dry ingredients. Cream butter. Add sugar and continue creaming until sugar granules are almost dissolved. Add beaten egg, then add dry ingredients alternately with milk, beginning and ending with dry ingredients. Add dates and nuts with last few stirs. Pour into a loaf cake pan that has been lined with waxed paper. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) one hour.

POTATO GROWERS DISCUSS PROBLEMS

Possibilities of expanding the acreage of early potatoes in the west end of Umatilla county were discussed at a meeting held in the Stanfield Grange hall Wednesday night. The discussion was led by E. R. Jackman, extension agronomist, and Arthur King, extension specialist in soils, and was attended by 15 interested

potato growers. Jackman stated that coast markets could absorb a considerable increase in early potatoes if marketed before mid-July, but that any expansion of present early potato acreage would depend on yields obtained and on growers being able to market before that time. He suggested that White Rows were probably the best variety to grow because of the preference shown by consumers for that shape of potato.

King, in discussing fertilization of potatoes, stated that to insure rapid growth of the potato plant during the cool weather of early spring it would probably be necessary to apply some nitrogen in the form of commercial fertilizer 16-20 amophos side dressed at the rate of 200 lbs. per acre, was suggested as being a practical application. Where a good growth of alfalfa had been plowed under the previous fall, available nitrogen in the soil would be increased and the amount of commercial nitrogen applied could be reduced without seriously slowing down early growth, he revealed.

Emil Zivney, Stanfield farmer and potato grower, stated that ridging of the rows apparently assisted in warming up the soil, thereby speeding up early growth.

The meeting was arranged by assistant county agent M. E. Knickerbocker.

CAMPAIGN FUND INCREASED HERE

A total of \$134.89 was realized by various means during the past week through the efforts of different organizations of the west end Umatilla county cities for President Roosevelt's campaign against infantile paralysis. Mrs. W. M. Marbut, who headed the campaign here, reported Wednesday that the Saturday night dance netted approximately \$100.

Organizations which made contributions included the Farm Bureau Co-operative, \$5.00; Townsend club, \$5.00 and Steele's orchestra, \$5.00. The remainder of the money was obtained through the cooperation of organizations of nearby cities and by the placing of miniature banks in various business locations. The money was turned over to George L. Lewis of Pendleton, county chairman, of the infantile paralysis campaign. Half of the money raised remains in the county for local use.

ANNUAL MEETING OF CO-OP. SET

The annual meeting of the Inland Cooperative of Hermiston will be held Saturday, February 22, in the Oddfellows hall in Hermiston. All producers who have traded with this concern until July 1, 1940, have been made members by the board of directors and will be eligible to vote at the annual meeting.
