### FACILITIES FOR HOUSING AT SITE

Federal funds for the construction of temporary housing facilities for workers on the Umatilla Ordnance Depot are en route, it was learned this week. The houses and barracks will be built at the site, it was understood. Word received here from Washington stated that the houses will be built on the "government reservation".

Although numerous attempts have been made to find a suitable site for the houses for construction personnel in or near Hermiston, no definite step has been taken. The information from Washington has not been definitely confirmed here.

## LINDGREN TELLS OF SHEEP PROBLEMS

Farm flock owners must learn to live with intestinal parasites because whenever irrigated pastures become infested, it is impossible to entirely eradicate them, it was stated by H. A. Lindgren, Extension Animal Husbandman, at a meeting in the Farm Bureau hall at Columbia park Wednesday night.

These so-called stomach worms have been known in Oregon for almost 30 years, but only recently have they become a problem on irrigated pastures in eastern Oregon, Lindgren revealed. Several treatments are available which, when given at regular intervals, may permit farm flock owners to continue in the business, he stated.

Lindgren also reviewed the outlook for meat animals for the coming year stating that with the increase in beef and dairy numbers and a probable increase in the next two years in swine population, there was a possibility of a surplus of both beef and pork two years or more hence. Such a surplus of both major types of meat animals might have a serious effect on meat prices. He predicted favorable prices for this year, however. The meeting was arranged by Assistant County Agent M. E. Knickerbocker.
