

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS
CALL FOR BIDS

The successful contractor is required to furnish the City with a performance bond in the full amount of the contract to insure faithful performance of the contract and to insure payment to all persons performing labor and furnishing material in connection with this work. Said bond shall be with an authorized Surety Company doing business in the State of Oregon and as approved by the City Council.

Plans and specifications may be secured from the Architect at Pendleton, Oregon. A set of the plans will be on file with the City Recorder for examination by contractors.

TURKEY MARKET PROSPECTS GIVEN BY RICHARD COX

"Turkey production and price statistics indicate that the number of turkeys raised in the United States and the purchasing power of consumers are the most important factors related to turkey prices from year to year," according to L. R. Breithaupt, Extension Agricultural Economist at Oregon State college. "Supplies and prices for other poultry and meats, and other factors such as the demand for turkeys from storage trade, are also of importance.

That consumer purchasing power affects turkey prices is indicated by the production and price data of the 1937-38 season, for example, compared with the season of 1933-34. Although turkey production in 1937 was materially greater than in 1933, prices were much higher, a circumstance largely accounted for by the higher level of consumer purchasing power and demand for turkeys in 1937-38 and 1933-34.

In 1939-40, however, despite the relatively good level of consumer purchasing power, particularly during the first half of the turkey marketing season, prices averaged lower than in 1937-38, owing principally to the very large supply of turkeys produced in 1939. Turkey production in 1939 was estimated at 32.7 million turkeys, compared with 26.3 million in 1938 and 25.6 million in 1937. The supply of other poultry and meats was also fairly large. The economic recession after January 1 affected the market adversely during the last part of the turkey marketing season at a time when the supply of turkeys was very large.

With respect to market prospects for turkeys in 1940-41, production is expected to be slightly larger than in 1939, in addition to larger storage stocks of turkeys carried over. The situation appears more favorable for young hens than for heavy toms, owing to the large supply of toms in storage. The average weight of the 1940 turkey crop is expected to be slightly larger and the present intention of growers indicates that more turkeys will be sold early in the season by growers.

Compared with a year ago, the farm price of turkeys is relatively low. The average farm price of turkeys alive in the whole country on September 15, 1940, was reported at 14.3 cents a pound, compared with 15.4 cents a year previous and 16 cents two years before. The basic supply and demand conditions, however, appear at least no worse than a year ago, considering market prospects for the whole of the 1940-41

marketing season against the whole of the 1939-40 season.

TRAFFIC RULES ARE STRESSED

Greater observance of the state regulation governing the operation of a motor vehicle being overtaken and passed by another is necessary in the interest of greater traffic safety in Oregon, according to a statement from the traffic safety division of the secretary of state's office today. Recently Oregon citizens have writ-

ten to the office, suggesting that motorists attention be called to the rules requiring overtaken cars to give way to the right when being passed on streets or highways. According to these suggestions, many drivers fail to observe this requirement with the result that the overtaking vehicle is forced out into the path of oncoming cars or is unable to go around the slower moving vehicle.

"The driver of an overtaken vehicle shall give way to the right in favor of the overtaken vehicle on suitable and audible signal and shall not increase the speed of his vehicle until completely passed by the overtaking vehicle," says Oregon law on this subject.

Courtesy and safe driving practice require the driver to observe this rule when being overtaken, the statement declared. Oregon law provides that cars always shall be driven as near the right hand side of the street or highway as is practicable and when slow-moving vehicles stay close to the center line, other vehicles are held up and passing is dangerous.

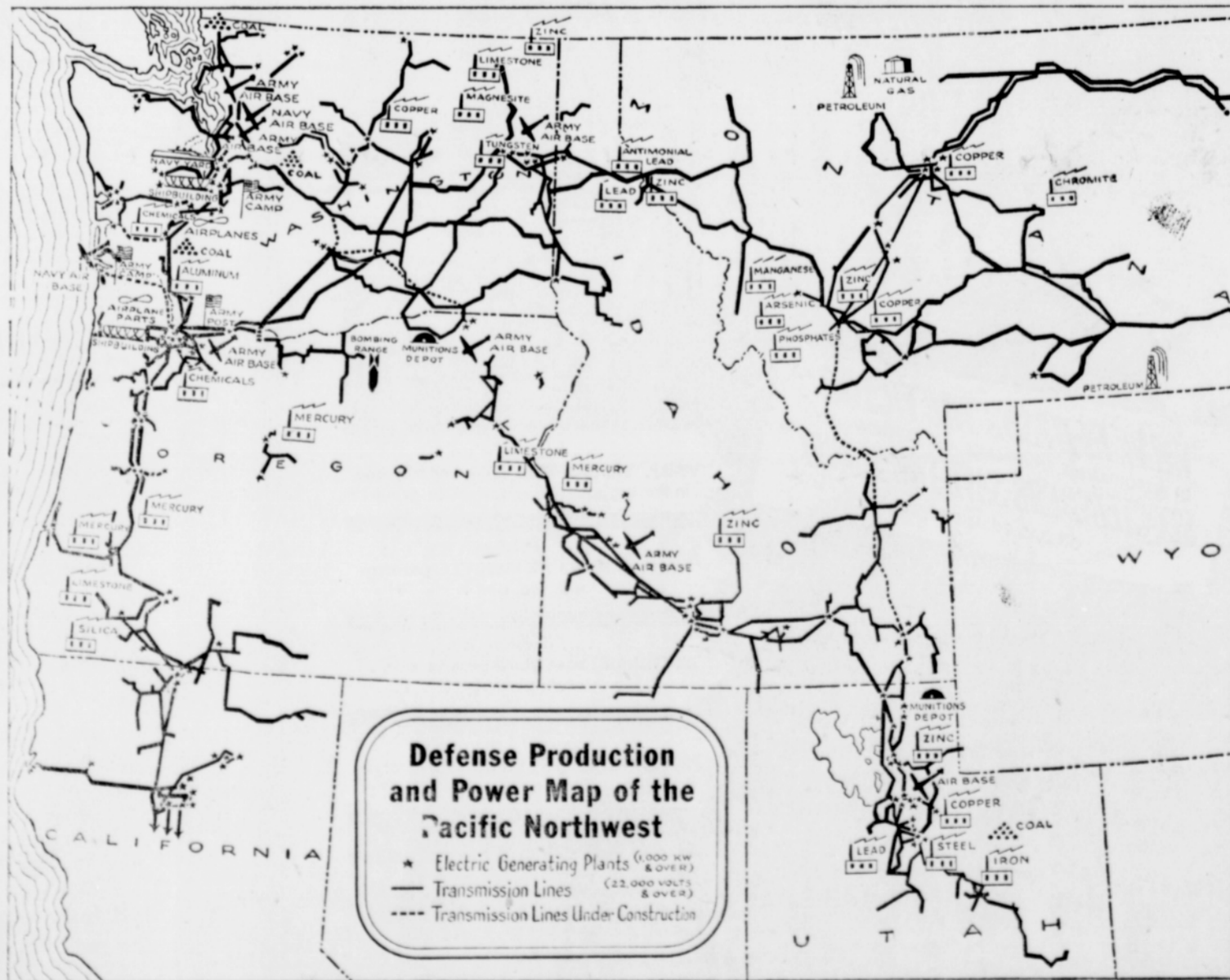

How Power Systems Link Northwest Defense Areas



Defense Production and Power Map of the Pacific Northwest

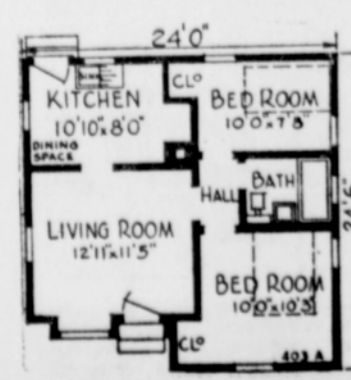
Avenues by which electricity can be dispatched instantly to any of the Pacific Northwest's defense production areas are shown on this "road map" of transmission lines, compiled by engineers of Pacific Power & Light and Northwestern Electric companies. Largely developed by the private utility companies of the five states, this network covers an area five times greater than that served by the noted British "grid" system. Extensive power company construction programs since 1918 have vastly strengthened the network and made electricity the Northwest's most mobile defense resource, according to Paul B. McKee, president of the Pacific Power & Light Company.

Generating plants of the region have 2,250,000 kilowatts of capacity, with an additional 400,000 kilowatts under construction. Nearing completion is the newest strategic link in the network, a 250-mile line which will interconnect the important copper, zinc and lead producing areas of northern Idaho and Montana with the mining and smelting centers of Utah. When this line goes into service it will be possible to shift power back and forth as needed all along the way from the seacoast to Salt Lake City. Importance of these system interconnections developed by the electric industry is that they insure a continuous and adequate supply of electricity everywhere on the network.
