### GARDEN CLUB CHATS

The Garden club will meet in the library basement Friday, March 14, at 2:30 p. m. Anyone interested may come to the meeting. You are always welcome. Since we hold the regular business at this time we want our paid up members to please attend. Matters come up for discussion that just can't be handled properly if you do not attend.

The past week has found many working in their yards, cleaning, burning, pruning and getting everything ready for spring. My diary shows that we are having much the same kind of weather and early growth as last year.

Since many shrubs will soon be in full bloom I think it fitting that some pointers should be given in pruning. I would advise studying the shrub before pruning.

Shrubs which flower before mid-summer should be pruned immediately after flowering. This will be the removal of old growth from the center and some shortening. Those flowering later in the summer need pruning now before growth starts as their flowers are borne on wood grown this present season.

Those shrubs that have been neglected or overgrown can be dealt with drastically. Just cut back to within a foot of ground before growth starts. This gives renewed life and better form.

The evergreens have an entirely

different method of pruning and should be studied to obtain best results.
