C. J. D. Bauman was a business visitor in this vicinity Monday.

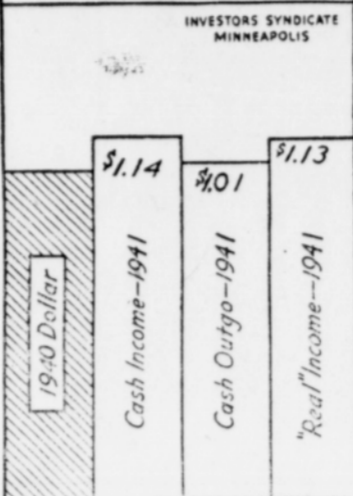
Willard Jones, who has been attending normal school at La Grande, came home Saturday.

American Income Rises 13 Cents; Living Costs Gain Cent Over 1940

PURCHASING POWER JANUARY, 1941, Compared with JANUARY, 1940



The above chart, showing the average American lived in national income change in the last twelve months, is based on the monthly consumers' study of Investors Syndicate of Minneapolis.

Mr. and Mrs. Public in January had a "real income" of \$1.13, or an increase of thirteen cents on the dollar over the same 1940 month. This "real income" is not a subtraction of cash income and expenditures, but an average relative of these figures designed to show how living costs affect adjusted income dollars.

Cash income of Mr. and Mrs. Public in January was \$1.14 for every \$1 a year earlier. This gain of fourteen cents on the dollar resulted from the following changes per dollar: wages up twenty-two cents and salaries ten cents; investment income was up six cents and other income was up eight cents on the dollar.

Rents in January were a cent higher than a year ago, but clothing, food and miscellaneous items were unchanged, making living expenses up a cent on the dollar over a year ago.

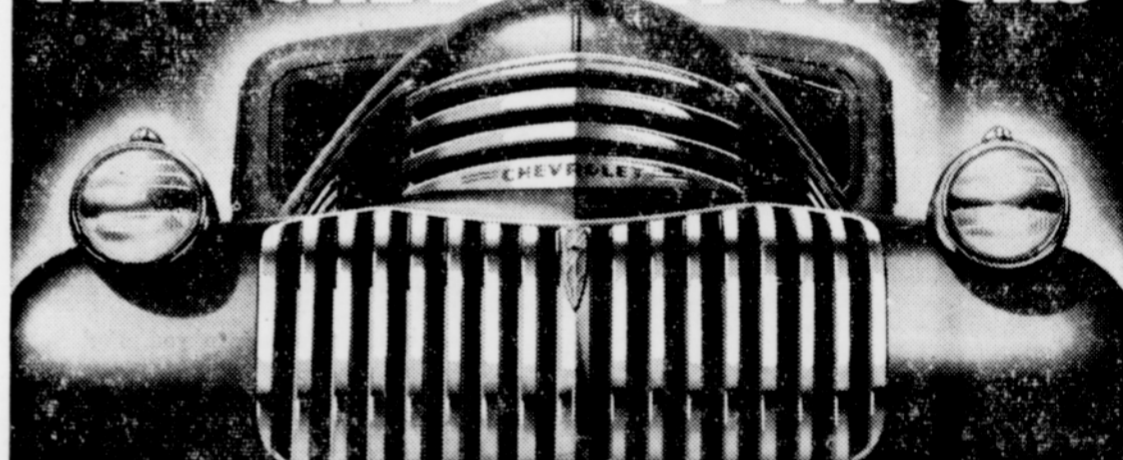
