Natives of the Belgian Congo number close to 11,000,000. There are only about 25,000 whites in the whole colony.

They also report that for the first time in history they have succeeded in giving monkeys leprosy, or something that had all its characteristics, by feeding them colcoasia root and injecting leprosy bacillus.

FEW CHANGES IN FISH REGULATIONS

Few changes in fishing regulations were made by the Oregon State Game commission under new powers granted under provision of Senate Bill No. 147, passed in the recent session of the legislature and signed by Governor Charles A. Sprague.

In fact, no alterations were made in closures or openings of streams affective at the February meeting of the commission.

The principal action of the commission was the designation of deadlines, above which angling will not be permitted in the high reaches of coastal streams. This restriction affects the Nehalem, Salmon, Necanicum, Umqua, Siletz and Nestucca rivers and Rock creek, and will be in effect until June 1. This will provide sanctuaries in which fish may spawn and hatch and was considered vital to conservation of fish, particularly in the case of the steelhead trout.

An open season for steelhead trout from May 3 to November 1, both dates inclusive, was established in Burnt river, Owyhee river and Malheur river.

An all-year open season for game fish over ten inches long, including cutthroat and rainbow trout and both steelhead and salmon, when under 15 inches in length, was ordered in that portion of all coastal streams above the head of tidewater.

The bar limit for these streams between October 16 and April 11, both dates inclusive, is three such fish in any one day but not more than 6 such fish in any 7 consecutive days.

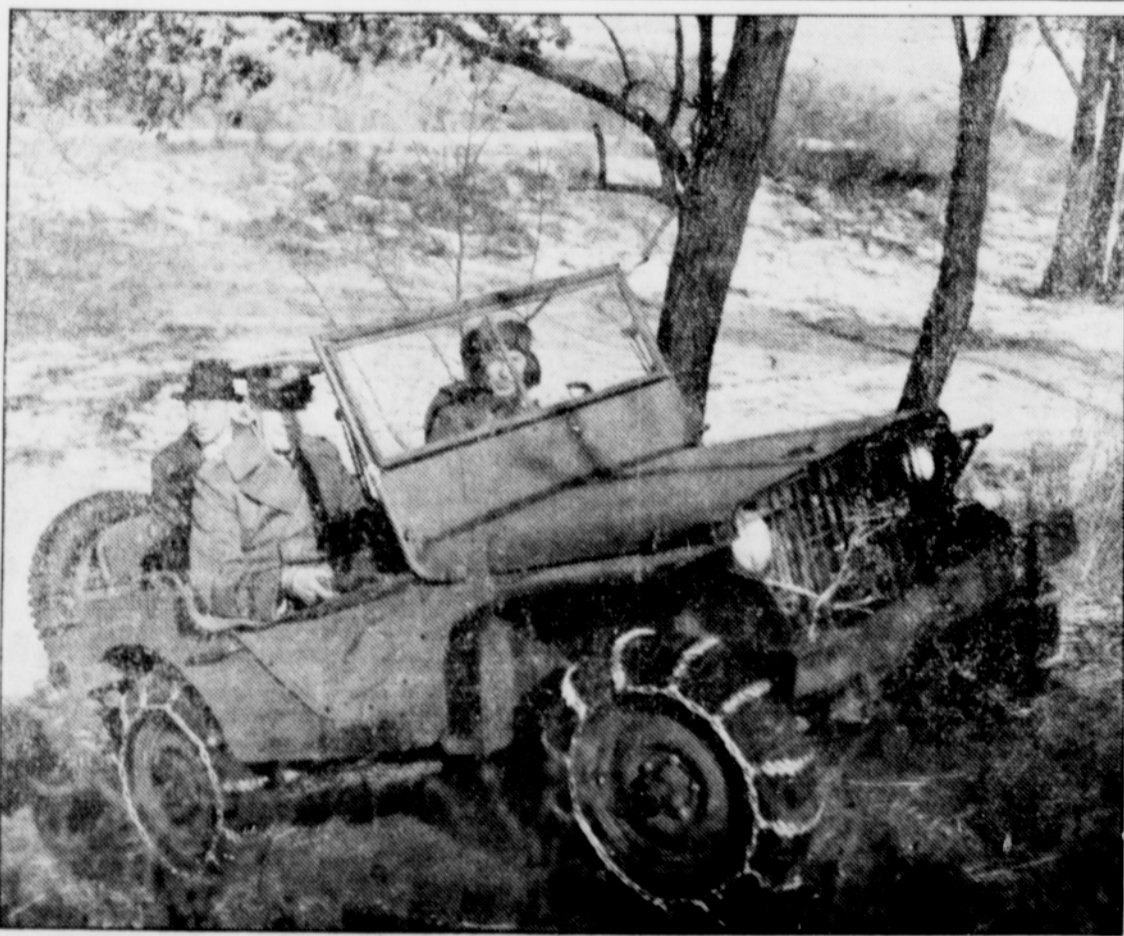

Over The Top in a Ford 'Blitz Buggy'



DEARBORN, Mich.—With Edsel Ford, president of the Ford Motor Company, and Brig. Gen. C. H. Bonesteel of the U. S. Army as passengers, a Ford test driver puts a "blitz buggy" through its paces. Built by Ford for the army, this tiny reconnaissance car is a four-wheel-drive vehicle that will climb 80 per cent grades and travel 55 to 60 miles an hour. They can be maneuvered over all types of terrain. An initial army order for 1,500 Ford "blitz buggies" already is rolling off a Rouge plant assembly line.
