TURKEY OUTLOOK MORE FAVORABLE

The turkey outlook for 1941 is somewhat more favorable than a year ago according to a report on the agricultural situation and outlook just issued by the Agricultural Extension Service at Oregon State college. The total number of turkeys on farms on January 1 this year was only 82 per cent as great as the year previous, and the number of turkey hens on hand February 1 was but 86 per cent of the number a year before. Growers reported intentions to produce 3 per cent less poult than in 1940. Based on past relationships,

this would suggest an actual decrease of around 5 per cent, unless growers should change their intentions one way or the other than usual or that growing conditions should be more or less favorable than usual. Storage stocks of turkeys on hand as of February 1 this year were about the same as the year previous but were smaller on March 1, and the rate of clearance during the next few months is expected to continue to be greater than last year.

In regard to consumer purchasing power and demand, it appears most probable that our defense program and a continuation of the war will result in an unusually high level of industrial employment and a strong domestic demand for the turkey crop of 1941.
