### AID SOLICITED FOR LOCAL HELP

Hermiston women who wish to contribute some constructive service to the defense program that is finding concrete evidence in the construction of the cantonment here, will be interested in the proposal that they establish a unit of the Oregon Women's Ambulance Corps, a non-profit, non-sectarian, non-political organization of intelligent, alert, and well-trained women, who have voluntarily banded together for training in the fields in which women could be most useful in any local or national emergency.

The requirements for membership are: citizenship, good standing in the community, in sufficiently good health to undergo training, enrollment in and completing of the mandatory courses: military drill, first aid, communication (signalling, short wave, telephone, Morse code, etc.), motor mechanics (roadside repairs), firefighting, have driver's license and eventually secure chauffeur's license, and wear uniform at all times in class or on duty. Twelve or more are required to form a local unit.

The uniform consists of a shirt and slacks of tan cotton gabardine, with a plain black tie and cotton gabardine cap. This material may be either cleaned or laundered. Sport shoes are worn. Jewelry is not worn nor is extravagantly colored nail polish.

Members wear uniforms because they are democratic, and because elaborate clothes have no place in a program of work and study which enrolls women from every walk of life. Moreover the uniform soon identifies you as a member of a service organization and demands respect.

Military drill serves two definite functions. First, it teaches women to obey the commands of their officers without question, and second it permits a dignified showing of the Corps in community gatherings. Military drill and courtesy, moreover, teach Corps members how to conduct themselves in emergency with the greatest efficiency and dispatch.

A meeting of the Westland Calf club was held April 6 with 19 members and three visitors present. Several of the members expressed interest in a pheasant raising project in addition to their calf club work. Some time was spent in calf judging. Delicious refreshments were prepared and served by the youngsters themselves. The next meeting will be April 27 at the J. D. Corliss home, according to Adacarol Corliss, reporter.

### DEADLINE SET FOR MATTRESS WORK

There is no time to lose if application is to be made for the surplus cotton mattress program. April 15, is the final date for filing these applications at the office of the county agent in Pendleton, Hermiston or Milton, the home demonstration agent's office, the Farm Security or the Welfare Bureau offices.

The government is giving 50 pounds of cotton and 10 yards of ticking to rural families which is adequate to make a double-bed mattress of fine quality. Eligibility is based first on the location of the home which must be in the country or a town of less than 2500 population, and second the family income for 1940. If all the income is from the farm the net income must not exceed \$500 for a family of four. If the income is from other sources it is also \$500 with fewer deductions from the gross income. The mattresses will be constructed under supervision by the families making applications.
