LEGISLATIVE BILL EFFECTS TAXPAYER

A bill passed by the last legislature is of interest to all tax payers of the county that pay on personal property. This is Senate Bill No. 234 which becomes effective June 14, 1941, and provides a new and mandatory process wherein warrants are to be issued, served and docketed in all cases of personal property delinquency, irrespective of the application of any other process of law for the collection of such taxes.

The amount of the warrant so docketed shall become a lien upon real property owned by the person against whom the warrant is issued. The sheriff has no choice in the matter but must file the judgments.

This law applies to all personal property for 1940 and prior years that is unpaid on June 14th. By personal property is meant all fixtures and furniture, if used for profit, livestock, machinery, merchan-

dise and equipment. If the taxes are not paid before June 14th, it would save the taxpayer the cost of the judgment and also some interest.

CLEAN UP DAY SET AT COLUMBIA PARK

The Farm Bureau auxiliary is planning a full day for Friday, April 18, when all members and others interested will meet to clean up the park and make minor improvements. The men are not excluded as considerable carpenter work still needs to be done.
