MATTRESS DATE IS EXTENDED

"Word has been received from Oregon State college that the date for making application for mattress materials has been extended from April 15 to April 30. This will permit any family who was unable to file an application prior to April 15, to do so during this extended period," says Miss Frances Clinton, home demonstration agent. Applications should be made at the county agent's office in Hermiston, Milton or Pendleton, or the Farm Security office or Welfare Bureau in Pendleton.

Umatilla county has received applications for 488 mattresses and an

order has been placed for a carload of cotton which is 24,000 pounds and 4,800 yards of ticking which will be sufficient to construct these mattresses.

Dates and centers of construction will be announced as soon as arrangements can be made. The cotton is expected to arrive about the middle of June.
