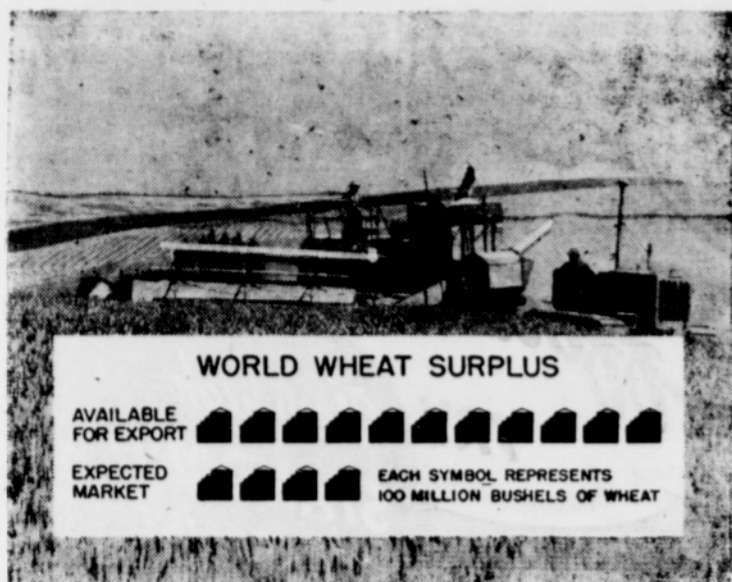


Wheat Competes for Market



As indicated by the chart above, wheat this year is competing strongly for the world's market. Principal producing countries such as Argentina, Australia, Canada, and the United States have more than a billion bushels for sale, but the total world market is expected to be less than half a billion bushels. U. S. farmers are being urged to continue planting in accordance with AAA Program wheat acreage allotments, to help balance American wheat supply with expected demand.

Whites can be placed immediately in waxed cartons or jars and need no treatment. Yolks are stirred thoroughly and one tablespoon of honey is added to every two cups of yolk. One tablespoon of sugar or one teaspoon of salt may be substituted for honey.

FIELD DAYS AT EXPERIMENTAL STATIONS ARRANGED

Experiment station field days are being scheduled at the central station in Corvallis and a number of the branch stations for the last week in May. While visitors are welcome on the various farms at any time, special arrangements are made to explain the progress of research work on these special days.

At the central station, May 27 has been set aside as Polk and Yamhill county day, May 28 as Linn-Lane day, and May 29 as the Marion county day. Forage and seed crop work, and weed control will be emphasized.

Two field days at the Pendleton weed experimental area on Indian reservation lands have been arranged for May 28 and 29. The first day will be for Umatilla county farmers and the second for those from other counties. At the Moro station a combined field day and grange picnic will be held June 28.

OREGON CLUBBERS SWEEP REGIONAL 4-H CLUB CONTEST

Two Oregon 4-H club members have just been announced as winners in the western division in the annual home and crops enterprise accounting competition, supervised by the extension service, according to notice just received by H. C. Seymour, state

club leader, from the national committee on boys' and girls' club work. The two winners are George W. Blinco, 19, of Portland, and Marjorie Woodard, 17, of Cottage Grove. Both will receive all-expense trips to the twentieth National 4-H club congress in Chicago next November, provided by the International Harvester company.

Although a city boy, young Blinco became interested in country life and arranged to keep accounts on John Mulloy's farm in Washington county. His work won for him first place in the state and now first prize in the farm division of the western region. He has been in club work seven years.

Miss Woodard has been a 4-H'er for eight years, serving three years as assistant leader. She also won the state championship in home accounting before her record was judged best in the west.

COMMENCEMENT AT O.S.C. JUNE 2 TO BE LARGEST

Oregon State College—The seventy-second annual commencement here June 2 will be the largest in the history of the institution in numbers of degrees granted, reports E. B. Lemmon, registrar. The tentative list shows students will receive 795 degrees, all earned, as compared with 790 last year when four honorary degrees were given. None of the latter is being awarded this year.

The largest number ever to receive Ph. D. degrees at one time here will be given this highest academic recognition this year. Eight have completed work for the doctorate. Of the remainder, 109 will receive masters' degrees, and 678 bachelors' degrees.

Employment prospects for the graduates are better than at any time in the past decade in most respects, according to reports of school heads, although men who are high on the selective service list are experiencing some difficulty in finding suitable placement in the interim.

Commencement week end will begin on Saturday with alumni reunions and will include baccalaureate service Sunday morning, June 1, at 11 o'clock, followed by the graduation exercises Monday at 10 o'clock.

FREEZING EGGS IN STORAGE LOCKERS FOUND PRACTICAL

Homemakers who have access to frozen food lockers may store eggs successfully in these lockers during the heavy laying season for use when egg prices are higher, according to experiments carried out at the school of home economics at Oregon State college.

Commercial freezing of egg whites and yolks has been practiced successfully for many years, but little if any work has been done to adapt the process to small-scale use in the home. A successful procedure for such small scale freezing, as well as experiments with the use of frozen eggs in cooking, has been carried out this winter by Gladys Hedlund, graduate assis-

tant, under the supervision of Miss Agnes Kolshorn, associate professor of foods and nutrition.

Egg yolks, particularly, require treatment before putting in a frozen locker, else they will be gummy and difficult to use when removed from storage. Miss Hedlund's experiments showed that the addition of a small amount of honey to the eggs before freezing is the most effective treatment, although salt, sugar, or corn syrup may be used satisfactorily for this same purpose.

Eggs for freezing must be clean before breaking and need to be handled in a sanitary manner, as it is important to keep bacterial contamination to the lowest possible point. For that reason cracked eggs are not recommended for use in freezing, even though the eggs are broken before being stored.

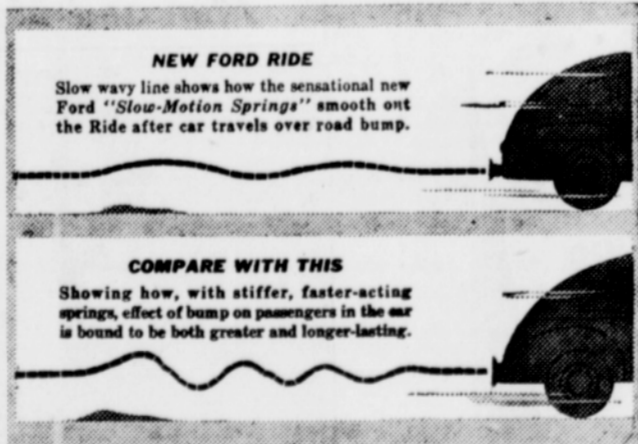
