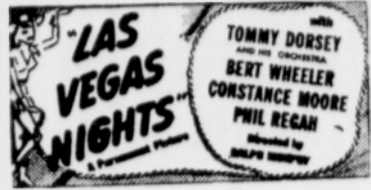

DEFERRMENTS FOR STUDENTS IN SCHOOL POSSIBLE NEXT YEAR

University of Oregon — Although actual deferment rests with local boards, university students will in many cases be given an opportunity to continue their studies next year, it was declared here by Dr. Earl M. Pallett, executive secretary of the University of Oregon, who spoke recently before a meeting of men eligible to selective service. Students who are in their second, third or fourth year of work at the university and who prefer to complete their requirements for graduation should request deferment for six months, with renewal, he pointed out. The rumor that only upperclassmen nearing graduation would be deferred is not true, he declared. Students applying for such deferr-

ment should have at least average grades, however, he said. since there are no arbitrary rules or regulations regarding such cases.

Apparently the tendency is to allow students to finish their university work whenever possible and when it will be in the best interests of the students, Mr. Pallett stated. All decisions rest entirely with local boards
