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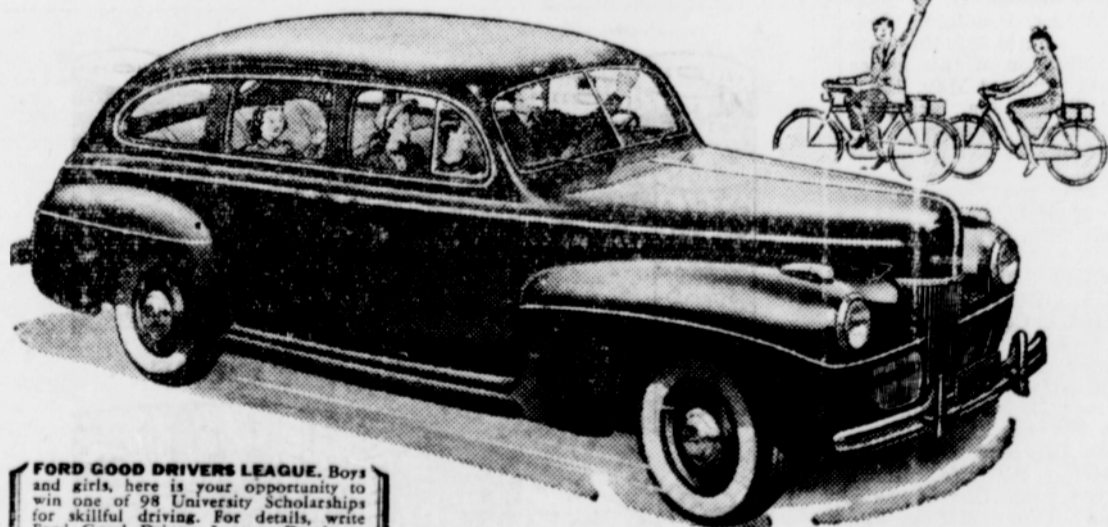
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**OREGON OFFICIALS URGE APPROVAL OF AAA WHEAT QUOTAS**

Leaders of Oregon's farm organizations and state officials, including Governor Charles A. Sprague, have endorsed wheat marketing quotas and

asked that they be approved by Oregon's wheat growers at the referendum this Saturday, May 31. The vote in this area will be held at the office of Assistant County Agent M. E. Knickerbocker from 9:00 a. m. till 9:00 p. m.

"There is no question but that Oregon will be much better off if the quota is approved," Gov. Sprague told the state AAA committee, at the same time announcing that he had voted for the quotas. The governor cast an absentee ballot as a wheat grower in Adams county, Wn. Pointing out that quotas must be adopted if wheat prices are to be supported by federal loans, the governor predicted that prices will drop to "very low levels" unless this aid is given.

Presidents of the state's farm organizations endorsed the quotas as follows: Mac Hoke, president Oregon Farm Bureau; Ray W. Gill, president Oregon State Grange; Harley Libby, president, Oregon Farmers' Union.
