KNOW YOUR EGG? THEN ALL'S WELL

Egg producers and handlers in several sections of the state have been learning more about care of eggs and the state law in a series of meetings conducted jointly by the state department of agriculture and the state college. Main purpose has been to coordinate grading so the Oregon housewife may buy eggs with full protection that she is getting that for which she pays.

Only three grades of eggs may be sold at retail: Grade AA, grade A and Grade B. All these must be clean eggs. Dirty eggs may be sold, but only as grade B, soiled. Many housewives do not realize that A grade eggs are very fine eggs and that actually the grade AA egg, held under normal conditions for 24 hours, usually develops a larger air cell than the law allows and so drops to a grade A egg.

Retailers must candle and grade eggs, but farmers or poultry raisers who produce eggs on their own premises may sell these eggs on the place where they were produced without candling or grading.
