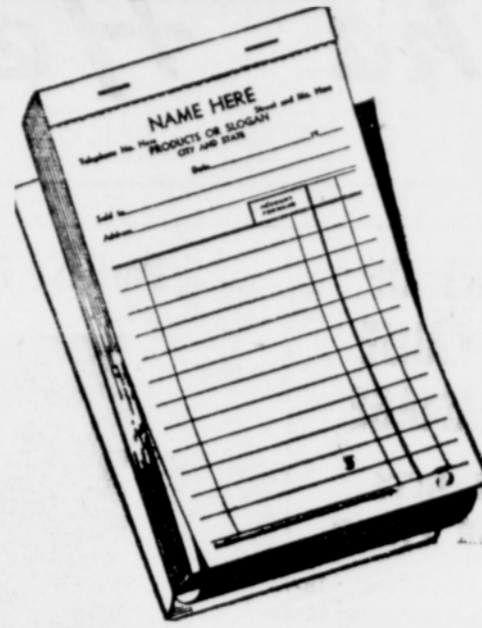

SHOP BUILDING BEGINS TO RISE

The first studding of the new shop building at the Hermiston Union high school was raised Wednesday. The new structure will be 30x60 feet and is being built with the cooperation of N.Y.A. funds. Approximately 12 to 15 boys are employed on the project.

W. G. Kersbergen, superintendent, stated Wednesday that the building will house a new shop course which is being added to the school curriculum. Students will be taught woodwork, auto mechanics, electric work, tin smithing and various other phases of practical mechanics.

LARGEST 4-H CLUB SESSION ENDS AT OREGON STATE

The nation's largest 4-H club summer session neared its end on the Oregon State college campus this week as 2054 youngsters from every county in the state finished up their classwork and prepared to leave for home on Friday morning, June 20. While there may be other places where more clubbers are gathered together for a few days, no state holds a two-week session with such a large number, according to H. C. Seymoure, state club leader.

An indication of the classwork taken may be had from the fact that the girls alone had 64 different sec-

tions available, totaling 2948 hours work during the ten days of scheduled study. The sections and hours for boys were not quite as high but added materially to the total.

Tentative registration figures showed 1305 girls and 749 boys in addition to between 150 and 200 local leaders and extension workers who assisted with the session. The clubbers set up their own governing groups with representatives from each of the 32 fraternity and sorority houses and three dormitories on executive committees.
