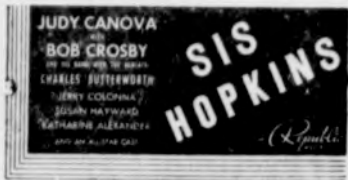

UMATILLA COUNTY GETS ROAD FUNDS

Oregon counties divided an \$800,000 present from the state highway commission Monday, the amount being the first installment of the commission's \$2,000,000 annual distribution to counties. The total apportionment for the year, with two-fifths of each amount distributed to each county this month and the other three-fifths to be allocated in December, includes:

Umatilla, \$52,972; Grant, \$13,236; Gilliam, \$5,882; Morrow, \$8,626; Sherman, \$5,832; Wheeler, \$5,278.
