## EXTENSION STAFF JOINS DRIVE FOR SCRAP ALUMINUM

The extension field staff, consisting of county agents, home demonstration agents and 4-H club agents, has been called upon by William A. Schoenfeld, director of the O.S.C. extension service, to assist county defense councils in every way possible in a nation-wide aluminum gathering campaign set for the week of July 21. This request to all members of

the staff followed a letter received from Dean H. Walker, acting governor, and Jerrold Owen, coordinator of the Oregon state defense council, who are directing the campaign in Oregon.

The nation-wide drive to collect old and unneeded aluminum of all kinds is to obtain additional supplies for use in production of defense equipment. Farm families, as well as those in the city, will be asked to contribute old aluminum utensils and un-used aluminum parts of any kind.

Items suggested include pots and pans, radio parts, toys, shakers, screening, old washing machine parts, picture frames, bookends, ice trays, measuring cups, camera equipment, kettles and double boilers, bottle and jar caps, refrigerator plates, electrical equipment of all kinds, and in fact, anything made of aluminum that is no longer needed or is worn out.

Tentative plans call for visits to be made at farm homes, beginning the week of July 21, when the aluminum will be called for.

It is estimated that the collection

of aluminum scrap will produce some 20 million pounds of aluminum, which will go to the smelting plants, where it will be made into secondary aluminum, which will in turn release 2 million pounds of first-class aluminum for use by the airplane industry. This extra 20 million pounds is enough to provide aluminum for 2000 fighter planes.

## OREGON REPORT ON FARM ADJUSTMENTS LOOKS TO FUTURE

The Oregon land use planning committee composed of farmers from different parts of the state and representatives of state and federal agencies has adopted and forwarded to Washington, D. C., a program for Oregon agriculture for the years of the present emergency and those immediately following. This report has already been submitted to a regional land use conference where it was praised highly by federal officials as being one of the most complete and carefully prepared of those submitted to the states.

"The plans projected in this report are but a continuation and adaptation of work that has been carried on for many years by farm people and various agencies," says Dean William A. Schoenfeld, chairman of the state committee. "In another sense, however, these plans are but a beginning in the development of an effective and adequate unified program. This is a continuing and long-time job."

Plans for the preparation of the report, which, as completed, covers 100 type-written pages, were initiated by the state committee early in January. The primary purpose was to recommend adjustments which would permit Oregon agriculture to contribute most towards national defense

and at the same time prepare it to withstand the impacts of the emergency period later to avoid the disasters which agriculture suffered following the first world war.

The preparation of the report was undertaken by four principal sub-committees, forestry, range livestock, general farming, and farm, home and rural life. As determined by the committee, the adjustments in Oregon agriculture for all-out defense fall into two closely related classes.

The first includes measures to meet changed and changing needs in the field of production. The second class includes measures for improving the welfare of the people so that they may meet the problems of defense with renewed vigor and with new confidence in the democratic way of life. These measures fall in the fields of health, nutrition, security and general morale. Later articles will deal with recommendations on these subjects.

The Congress of the United States recognizes the situation, but its agencies have not carried out as yet its promise. Free education has long been regarded as the birthright of American children. In this case parents will have to help local officials in securing these rights. If you have a child you want to enroll in the Hermiston schools, make it known to your employers, if they be federal agencies that you want service and insist upon it as an American citizen, with such a strong demand from employees, superior officers can see that it receives the same representation among the dilatory bureaus at Washington.

We repeat that local school officials have fought your battle, as far as they can, now parents must see that their needs are heard in Washington. Local school people have spent weeks of effort and cannot go further. The plain facts are that if the school fails and the parents fail to get government funds for construction, equipment and operation then the Hermiston schools will be unable to accept any children who did not attend the Hermiston schools last year.

If all parents will use every effort to place the importance of this school grant before depot officials so they may present it to Washington, or if
