**MORE VITAMINS NEEDED IN DIET**

"Eat more vitamins as food" sums up one phase of nutritional advice being given by the Oregon committee on nutrition for defense. This is not a campaign against the synthetic vitamins, which have a definite place—particularly for men and animals suffering from marked vitamin deficiency. For the ordinary person, however, there is much more satisfaction and far less expense to getting one's vitamins in the natural state, the committee points out.

At the recent national conference on nutrition several speakers pointed out that eating should be fun. This is considered good psychology, and also good hygiene. If that be the case, a good cold glass of tomato juice should afford more pleasure than a dose of ascorbic acid, while a juicy steak, a well prepared pot roast, or a well cooked pork chop rich in vitamin B-1 is something to get excited about.

A considerable number of specialists in nutrition hold that a rich natural source of vitamins often have an effect beyond that shown by a pure synthetic product. Many recognized natural sources of vitamins contain substances which apparently increase the potency and value of the vitamins themselves. In addition, foods, of course, supply the other necessary elements of good nutrition, including

minerals. On the side of economy the normal healthy individual will find that the cheapest source of vitamins is the way they come from the farms, where both field crops and livestock products afford a wide range from which one can select the full list of vitamins and at the same time have foods that please the palate.

Considerable difference of opinion seems to exist among specialists as to the effect of taking excess amounts of vitamins in pure form. Some believe it well established that it is difficult or impossible to use too much of the vitamins, with the possible exception of vitamin D. On the other hand, some equally eminent nutritionists say that this phase has not been sufficiently investigated to draw conclusions. All agree, however, that a normal healthy individual can obtain ample vitamins from natural foods with no possible danger of overdosing.

**HOW TO CONSERVE STUBBLE IS PROBLEM**

The heaviest grain stubble Oregon or the Pacific northwest has seen in a decade or more may still be handled and returned to the soil with a bit of advance planning, according to O.S.C. extension and Soil Conservation men who are familiar with western tillage methods. Burning is unnecessary and costly in soil losses, they say.

The rank straw growth resulted from abnormal rainfall during May and June and early planting of winter wheat last fall. Wet weather and winds have caused much of the grain to go down, making it difficult to harvest. The net result, it was pointed out, is the heaviest winter wheat stubble in many areas since northwest farmers began turning away from stubble burning and took to using straw scatterers on their combines and tillage methods that conserve the straw for soil-protection and improvement.

Foreseeing that many farmers will consider it impossible to utilize the large amount of straw on the ground, and will either burn or be tempted to burn, the tillage men emphasized that the extra work required to handle the greater amount of straw this year will be well worth the effort. Here is what they recommend:

On land to be summer-fallowed—Fall disking, as soon as possible after harvest while the stubble is dry, getting the equipment ready now. The disking, with sharp disks, breaks up the straw and stirs the ground just enough to bring a large percentage of the straw in contact with the soil, so that it will decompose enough during the winter to enable the farmer to make good use of it in next season's summerfallow. An additional disking before plowing might be necessary, even, if the straw is still quite heavy next spring.

On land that is to be planted to wheat next spring—Disking immediately after harvest, likewise, with rough plowing later in the season to cover part of the straw and leave part of it on the surface as a protective mulch. The tillage is done effectively with either short moldboards or with the heaviest type of one-way disks.

**DE ARMOND IS NEW SOIL SPECIALIST**

Ivan DeArmond, until recently a member of the area staff of the Soil Conservation service, has been appointed extension soil conservationist for Oregon with headquarters at Oregon State college, announces William A. Schoenfeld, dean and director of agriculture.

DeArmond is a graduate of O.S.C. in 1928, after which he was in industrial research work for two years before joining the staff of what was then the Soil Erosion service at Pullman. With the organization of the Soil Conservation service he was transferred to Spokane, and later to western Oregon as area conservationist. He succeeds Grant Pery who is now assistant county agent in Baker county.
