EXTENSION GROUP TO AID COMMISSION

The Oregon State Game Commission has asked the cooperation of the Extension Service to get information into the hands of all landowners or lessees of land that they will be required to register the location of their lands and obtain a certificate of registration of said lands before hunting or trapping fur-bearing animals.

Under provisions of a law passed by the 1941 legislature, all landowners or lessees of land are required to register the location of their land and obtain a certificate of registration of said lands before hunting or trapping fur-bearing animals. There is no charge for the registration or certificate.

The County Extension offices at Pendleton, Hermiston and Milton will soon be supplied with blanks which landowners may use in complying with the terms of the Oregon law. "The blanks may be had upon request at those offices," says Walter A. Holt, County Agent.

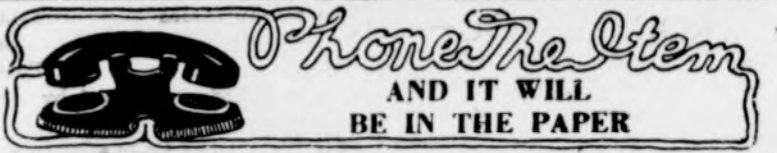
