FARMERS SEEK AAA COOPERATION

Oregon farmers, who led the nation in approving wheat marketing quotas at the May 31 referendum, are taking steps to see that quotas accomplish their purpose in this state. A. R. Coppock, chairman of the county AAA committee declared yesterday.

Because of this cooperative attitude, most of the wheat in excess of marketing quotas in this county will be stored and held off the market. It is estimated that the amount of excess wheat in the county will total 175,000 bushels.

"AAA does not want to collect penalties on marketing quota excess wheat, and we have advised farmers to use the storage privilege to defer or avoid payment of the 49c a bushel penalty," the chairman said.

POWER EMPLOYEES CARRY PASS CARDS

As a precautionary measure against possible sabotage, all employees of Pacific Power & Light company, whose duties take them to the company's substations or generating plants or to defense industries, now carry individual identification cards, according to J. A. Clarke, local manager for the company.

STATE EXEMPTS RURAL PHONES

The State Tax Commission has issued orders exempting from taxation approximately 700 non-profit cooperative or privately owned telephone lines in the State of Oregon. Included in these orders were 30 companies in Umatilla County.

These exemptions were made in conformance with Chapter 11, Oregon Laws of 1941. Any lines not having completed the requirements of the law and which can or care to qualify for exemption should get in touch with the State Tax Commission immediately.
