STERILITY FACTS REVEALED IN NEW O.S.C. BULLETIN

All the answers to the problem of sterility in dairy cows are still far from being found, but considerable information on some things blamed wrongly for sterility, and on other things that may contribute to it, is contained in a new experiment station bulletin issued at Oregon State college, entitled "Reproductive Performance in Dairy Cattle."

Although the bulletin is semi-technical in that it reports on actual research studies, it is expected to contribute much to the general understanding of the sterility problem. It is well illustrated with drawings of the reproductive organs of dairy cattle and of the reproduction process, a number of these drawings being life size.

Studies of the cow families represented in the O.S.C. dairy herd for the past 25 years have definitely shown the importance of inheritance in good fertility. These and similar studies indicate that much of the low fertility in commercial herds may be traced to poor inheritance and close breeding practices.

Among factors studied and found to be either relatively unimportant, or which so far have failed to throw a vital relationship to the problem are vitamin A deficiency, the use of vitamin E injections, and the use of hormone injections, although the last named is still definitely in the experimental stage.

Many non-specific infections in both male and female dairy animals were found to impair the breeding efficiency, although Trichomonad infection has not been demonstrated in Oregon up to the present time. Losses through the sale of dairy animals thought to be sterile but which were not have been found to be rather severe. Between 20 and 25 per cent of dairy cows sold to Oregon slaughter houses as sterile have been found to be pregnant.

PUBLIC WARNED AGAINST IRRIGATED LAND SALESMEN

"Write the bureau before you buy" any land in a federal reclamation project and particularly in the huge Columbia basin project to be watered from the Grand Coulee dam.

This advice from the bureau of reclamation is being broadcast far and wide in view of persistent attempts of certain land speculators to unload practically worthless land on investors and home seekers by misrepresenting it as good land soon to be irrigated, says J. C. Moore, representative of the bureau of agricultural economics, stationed at Oregon State college.

A recent specific case cited is that of a young Montana couple who were induced to agree to pay \$500 for land in the Columbia basin project which proved to be so-called Class 6, or poor land for which no irrigation water will ever be provided under present plans. The land is roughly estimated to be worth about \$2 an acre instead of the \$23.50 per acre they agreed to pay.

The bureau of reclamation at Coulee Dam, Wn., is prepared to answer any inquiries promptly and without charge, in regard to land in the Columbia basin project, says Moore. Some land may remain without water for 20 years or more, as the plan is to bring under irrigation only small parcels each year.

Neither the bureau of reclamation nor any other agency of the federal government has land to sell and no one is authorized to represent them in the sale of such lands, Moore adds.
