CITY ADOPTS NEW MILK ORDINANCE

The city of Hermiston Friday passed a grade-A milk ordinance, effective immediately, and providing fines of not more than \$100 or more than 50 days in jail or both for violations. The ordinance provides for regulation of production, transportation, processing, examination, grading, labeling, regrading and sale of all milk and milk products within Hermiston's police jurisdiction, also for inspection

of dairy herds, dairies and milk plants and for issuing and revocation of permits to milk producers and distributors in accordance with Oregon laws. It also provides for placarding of restaurants and other establishments serving milk and milk products.

The ordinance gives the state department of agriculture jurisdiction with Hermiston, according to Cleo Fogelson, state department of agriculture officer stationed here, who assisted city officials at Hermiston in preparing the ordinance. Mr. Fogelson for some time has been cooperating with Hermiston with reference to milk and food handling problems and expressed the belief that the new ordinance would cover the situation very well.

This ordinance is a new procedure with the city adopting the state law by reference, thus relieving the city of expenses of enforcing the ordinance which is left in the hands of the state department.

ARMY TO BUILD MORE RAIL TRACKS

Additional railroad trackage totaling 130 miles and to cost approximately \$255,000 is under construction at fourteen western Army posts, it was announced in San Francisco recently at the office of the Ninth Zone Constructing Quartermaster.

Several hundred miles of access railroads and spurs have already been built in the Ninth Corps area under the Defense Program, to provide for transportation of equipment, materials and labor to and within project sites during construction, and the movement of troops, equipment and supplies to stations after completion. Constant expansion of posts and the addition of new facilities indicate no immediate decline in Army railroad building.

Per mileage cost is generally about \$10,000, though in mountainous region and where track must be laid on piers, the cost may mount to \$30,000 per mile. Considerable savings however, have been effected by the utilization of used rails secured from abandoned lines.

Largest amount of trackage being laid in the Ninth Zone is at the Umatilla Ordnance Depot, Hermiston, Oregon, where 23.3 miles is underway at a cost of \$932,142.

WAGE INSURANCE INSPECTION SLATED

A complete check-up on new firms which have begun operations in the Pendleton-Hermiston area during recent months will be made during the next ten days by O. M. Johns, special field representative for the State Unemployment Compensation Commission.

With headquarters at the Hermiston and Pendleton offices of the State Employment Service, Mr. Johns will get in touch with new firms in Boardman, Irrigon, Umatilla, Echo, Stanfield, Hermiston and Pendleton. All concerns which have employed four or more persons on any day during a quarter in which \$500 in wages was paid must pay unemployment insurance of 2.7 per cent. If they employ eight or more persons, they are also subject to the federal tax of 0.3 per cent.

OREGON TO SHARE NATIONAL DRIVE FOR "WAR FOODS"

More eggs, more milk, more beef and veal, and more farm gardens will be Oregon's principal part in agriculture's all-out mobilization for defense in 1942, according to Robert B. Taylor of Pendleton, chairman of the Oregon USDA agricultural defense board.

Oregon's production goals, brought back from an eleven state conference of farmers and farm leaders at Salt Lake City last week, have been reviewed and accepted by the state defense board, Taylor said. Within the next two weeks, a statewide drive will be launched to marshal the state's productive strength behind the program.

"Oregon agriculture has been given its biggest job and we must deliver," Taylor declared. "With the assurance of Secretary Wickard that achieving these production goals is just as important to the nation as building tanks and planes, I am confident that our Oregon farmers will get the job done."

Program leaders will now break down the state goals into county figures after which a farm-to-farm drive will be made to get the increases promised on a voluntary basis.

An 11 per cent increase in milk production is asked from this state in 1942, or an increase from 1,431,000,000 to 1,589,000,000 pounds. Most of this increase must come from increasing production of present dairy herds. Other important state goals and the percentages of increase over

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this year's productions are as follows:
EGGS, 32,853,000 dozen, up 12 per cent; beef cattle and calves, marketing and farm slaughter, 280,088,000 pounds, 22 per cent increase; hogs, marketing and farm slaughter, 66,538,000 pounds, a decrease of 5 per cent; sheep and lambs, 91,250,000 pounds, down 1 per cent; corn, 5,000 acres, up 7 per cent; oats, 330,000 acres, same as 1941; barley, 170,000 acres, a 15 per cent decrease. All hay, 1,007,000 acres, same as 1941; wheat 756,000 acres (official allotment), a 10 per cent decrease; rye, 42,000 acres, down 20 per cent; flax for seed, 5000 acres, up 150 per cent; green peas for processing, 35,000 acres, up 11 per cent; snap beans for processing, 3300 acres, up 6 per cent; farm gardens, an increase from 43,034 to 59,500; commercial vegetables for fresh use, 40,700 acres, up 2 1/2 per cent.
