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MARKET PROSPECT GOOD FOR OREGON ANIMAL PRODUCTS

An unusually favorable market outlook for poultry and dairy products and for meats and wool during the 1941-42 marketing season is indicated by a report just issued by the Oregon agricultural extension service. The report also points out that farm labor and other costs have advanced materially during the past year and may be expected to increase further, although gains made in farm prices for eggs, milk, meat and wool have been more rapid.

The longer-time outlook is problematical, as animal numbers are increasing and much uncertainty exists as to the duration of the present extremely high level of consumer purchasing power. One indicator of the current strength of consumer purchasing power is the record high level of industrial production, already 60

per cent greater than before the European war started.

Additional strength is given to the market demand for animal products by the government call for more milk, meat, and eggs in the food-for-defense program. These conditions have helped boost farm prices for dairy products 35 per cent since the war started, meat 56 per cent, eggs and chickens 30 per cent, and wool 62 per cent. Further increase in the level of industrial production appears probable within the next year.

The demand for milk products is being emphasized by the government, particularly, to supply consumers in this country and for shipment to England, and much more meat and eggs are wanted in 1942. Although prices for feed are higher than a year ago, the total supply of feeds in the United States is larger than last year and far above average. The number of animals is enough greater to slightly more than offset the increase in feed supplies, especially of grain. Hay supplies in relation to livestock are as

large as last year and near the record level.

With respect to beef cattle the report says that "from a long-time viewpoint the outlook for cattle would be better if marketings in 1941-42 were heavy enough while prices are high to stop the increase in numbers. Already there are enough cattle on hand to provide more beef and veal per capita than has been consumed for many years, although not as much as a quarter century ago" This is in line with the food-for-defense goals for Oregon.

MUCH OREGON WHEAT PUT UNDER GOVERNMENT LOAN

The amount of Oregon wheat placed under federal loan so far this year is already double the total amount for the entire year of 1940, the state AAA office announced.

Two thousand loans, totaling \$6,742,499 on 7,235,219 bushels of wheat, have been reported up to September 15 as approved by the Commodity Credit corporation. Reports from the counties indicate that the flow of wheat under loan is continuing at a heavy rate, and will continue until the market price equals or exceeds the 85 per cent of parity loan value.

AAA officials believe that well over half of Oregon's bumper wheat crop will move under loan, because of the high loan rate, made possible by growers cooperating to limit production under marketing quotas.

PRIORITY RATING ESTABLISHED HERE

Announcement was made by Mayor F. C. McKenzie yesterday, upon advice from Folger Johnson, State Director of the Federal Housing Administration in Portland, that the Office of Production Management, Division of Priorities, in collaboration with the Defense Housing Coordinator, has established certain procedures for obtaining priority assistance for defense housing construction, and will utilize the facilities of the Federal Housing Administration in determining compliance with the requirements of the O.P.M.

Applications for priority ratings are to be made on forms furnished by the Federal Housing Administration or local lending institutions in the Pendleton-Hermiston areas, and are to be presented to the Portland office of the F.H.A.

"The applicant must be the user of the materials or equipment, before filing his application he should consider carefully the outline of procedure for obtaining preference ratings issued by the O.P.M. in Washington, D. C.," Johnson's communication stated.

Mayor McKenzie was advised that the Federal Housing Administration will furnish contractors with complete instructions and application blanks upon written request to the F.H.A. office in Portland.

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
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
