BOARD PASSES RULES FOR SANITATION

efficient to prevent littering of the premises with rubbish, garbage or other refuse or waste shall be provided and maintained.

C. CAMPING SPACE—
a. Each camp shall provide not less than 400 square feet of space (20 feet x 20 feet minimum) for each trailer coach or camping space. If a motor vehicle is to be parked in the camping space, then 600 square feet of space (20 feet x 30 feet) shall be provided.

b. Trailer camps shall have driveways of at least 20 feet wide between rows of trailer coaches or camping space.

c. Driveways and trailer camping spaces shall be well marked in daytime and well lighted at night.

d. Camp sites shall be well drained and free from insect breeding places.

D. FIRES—
Fires shall be made only in stoves or other equipment provided for that purpose. Open, unattended fires shall not be permitted.

E. WATER SUPPLY—
An adequate supply of safe water for drinking and domestic purposes shall be provided. The water supply shall be easily obtainable from its source or a pipe distribution system. Water faucets shall be conveniently located.

Plans and specifications for new water supply systems shall be submitted to the State Board of Health for examination and approval before construction may begin.

Dipping from open springs, wells or irrigation ditches, or other open sources of water supply is prohibited. Use of common drinking cups or containers is prohibited.

F. SEWAGE DISPOSAL—
a. Sewage shall be disposed of in a manner which will not create a nuisance, pollute a stream, lake or other body of water, or contaminate a water supply, bathing place or shellfish

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growing area.

b. Either water-flushed or fly-tight sanitary privies shall be provided and shall be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition. Except where fly-tight sanitary privies are used, concrete or other equally impervious floors shall be provided in public toilet rooms. Plumbing shall conform to the state plumbing code. Toilets and bath rooms shall be well ventilated to the outside air, and shall be well lighted both at day and night.

c. Separate toilets for males and females shall be provided, one for each 15 males, and one for each 15 females, or fraction thereof.

d. Toilets shall be provided within 200 feet of every camping space.

e. Location of all toilets shall be plainly indicated by appropriate signs.
f. Waste water from sinks, showers, toilets, and other plumbing fixtures in camps or trailer cars shall not be deposited on the surface of the ground, and all such fixtures when in use shall be connected to a sanitary sewer system, or to suitable fly-tight metal containers which can be emptied into conveniently located slop sinks.

g. One or more slop sinks properly

connected with a sanitary sewer or septic tank and conveniently located shall be provided within 100 feet of every camp or trailer camp space.

h. Plans and specifications for new sewerage systems and sewage treatment facilities shall be submitted to and approved by the State Board of Health before construction may begin.

G. GARBAGE AND REFUSE DISPOSAL—
Fly-tight metal garbage containers having close-fitting covers shall be provided in convenient locations and in ample numbers. These containers shall not be permitted to become foul-smelling, unsightly or breeding places for flies.

H. COMMUNICABLE DISEASES—
It shall be the duty of all camp site owners, managers or other persons knowing or suspecting the presence of persons in camps having communicable diseases to report these conditions immediately to the local health officer.

I. RESPONSIBILITY—
Each and every owner or lessee of any camp site shall be responsible for full compliance with these regulations.
