NEW TAXES ADDED BY REVENUE ACT

J. W. Maloney, Collector of Internal Revenue, called attention today to the fact that the Revenue Act of 1941 imposed a number of new taxes, which became effective October 1, that will affect thousands of taxpayers who were not heretofore liable for taxes.

Mr. Maloney stated that the tax of 10 per cent, imposed on retail sales of jewelry, toilet preparations, and furs, became effective October 1, and that these taxes would affect many dealers who were ordinarily not classed as jewelers, druggists, or fur dealers. The tax on jewelry applies not only to the retail sale of articles which are commonly termed jewelry but also to the sale of any article made of, ornamented, mounted, or fitted with precious metals or imitations, and also watches and clocks, including electric clocks. All retail sales of articles coming under these classes, both new and used goods, would be subject to tax at the rate of 10 per cent of the retail price. This would mean that many hardware stores and drug stores, as well as many furniture stores, general stores, and specialty gift shops would be subject to the tax of 10 per cent on their retail sales of jewelry, clocks, watches, or other articles made of, or ornamented, mounted, or fitted with precious metals or imitations thereof.

The merchandise taxed under the retail sales tax on toilet preparations includes a long list of articles commonly known as cosmetics, etc. Many places selling toiletries, such as general stores, groceries, etc., would be subject to this tax. This law also has a provision which states that all sales to beauty parlors and barber shops, by a wholesale or retail dealer, are considered as retail sales and subject to tax, and also that any resale of the article, that is made by the operator of a beauty parlor or barber shop, is also subject to the 10 per cent retail tax. However, the operator can deduct from his tax a credit of the tax he may have paid when he bought the toilet preparations.

The tax on furs applies not only to articles made of fur, but also to articles of which fur is the component material of chief value. This would mean that persons who sell fur trimmed coats, for example, would be subject to tax on the retail sales price of the coat, if the fur trimming was worth more than any other single component material which was used to make up the coat.

All of these taxes are paid on a monthly basis, and the tax for the month of October should be sent to the Collector's office at Portland, during November. Collector Maloney urged that all persons liable for payments of these retail taxes write immediately to his office for blanks on which to return the tax.

He also called attention to the fact that all persons operating coin-operated amusement devices or gaming devices would be subject to a tax of \$10.00 a year on the amusement devices, and \$50.00 a year on the gaming devices. These taxes must be paid to the Collector during October, and all persons who are operating pin-ball machines or gaming devices should make application immediately for a blank on which to return the tax. Penalties will be incurred if the tax returns for the amusement and gaming devices are not received in October.

The tax on tires and inner tubes was increased by the Revenue Act of 1941, effective October 1, and all persons having these articles for sale October 1 were required to take an inventory of the same and pay a floor stocks tax on them. Forms have been distributed to a large number of dealers in the state, but all persons who are liable for the tax who have not received the forms should write for them immediately as the tax must be paid to the Collector in October.

ANNOUNCE OFFICE WORKER'S EXAMS

New examinations for office workers applying for jobs with the State Unemployment Compensation Commission were announced today by Professor William Griffith, supervisor for the Board of Examiners.

Six classifications with starting pay from \$80 to \$120 a month are listed in the announcement. The positions include junior and senior clerk-typists, junior and senior clerk-stenographers, key punch operator and junior tabulating machine operator.

Although educational and experience requirements vary, high school graduation and some training or job performance, in the main, are necessary to gain admittance to the examinations.

Because of increased demands from defense industries for office help, many of last year's merit lists already have been exhausted. Appointments from the new lists will follow closely upon completion of the tests, it is expected.

Complete information and application blanks may be obtained from the 23 local offices of the state employment service or from the Portland office, 701 Spalding Building, of the Board of Examiners, where all applications must be forwarded before November 10. Examination centers will be selected from Portland, Salem, Klamath Falls, Eugene, Medford, Ontario, Bend, Pendleton and Marshfield.
