### MARINES OFFERED "BLITZ" COURSES

The U. S. Marine Corps is now offering its enlisted personnel an opportunity to take what are called "blitz" courses. The new, streamlined courses, according to Sergeant Robert E. Lucas, non-commissioned officer in charge of the Walla Walla recruiting station, are designed for speedy completion and reduce the amount of physical effort required of students in answering examination questions. The courses have been recently developed by the Marine Corps Institute, which for years has enabled enlisted men of the Marine Corps to further their education and training by enrolling in any of a great variety of correspondence courses they may choose, free of charge.

Under the "blitz" formula, a marine who is familiar with the theory and operation of gasoline engines will not be required to complete the work on these texts, but may proceed immediately with the special automobile chassis course, or any other of the courses which fills his immediate needs.

The present series of "blitz" courses have been developed for men undergoing instruction in the motor transport, refrigeration, and water distillation schools, and also for men in the field who are engaged in these activities or contemplated doing so in the future. The Marine Corps Institute anticipates further advances along these lines, and hopes, eventually, to have available special "blitz" courses in radio, telephony, aviation, shop practice, electricity, road building and general construction.

The Marine Corps not only maintains seventeen different vocational training schools of its own, but its members have access to other trade school where selected men can prepare themselves for the future.

### GAME COMMISSION PLANTS SAGE HENS

Members of the Oregon game commission were in this territory this week and released a number of sage hens at the Cold Springs reservoir. The birds were all banded. The catch was made approximately 50 miles from Burns and rushed here by fast truck. It was stated that the birds would not live in captivity for very many hours.

With about four minutes remaining in the game, Pendleton launched a determined drive, but time ended as the invaders completed a 20-yard pass on the Hermiston 20.

Both elevens were bothered by frequent fumbles in the first half.

Early in the clash, Pendleton hammered down to the Hermiston 12 but lost the ball on downs. Hermiston was deep in Pendleton territory in the second period, but lost the ball when they switched from their generally effective ground game to passing strategy which failed.

Hermiston rolled up 15 first downs and 252 yards from scrimmage, while Pendleton gained 11 first downs and 170 yards.

theria, or how susceptible they are to the disease. Children past eight (8) years of age cannot get diphtheria immunizations in group clinics, but will have to go to their private physicians as this age group require smaller doses given over a longer period of time.

Diphtheria and smallpox epidemics can be prevented if everyone will do his part in making himself immune. It will be too late when sickness strikes.
