Ordinance Depot, and also certain other projects such as the water and sewage project at Hermiston and the highway bridge at Stanfield will create a number of jobs in two or three months time," Robbins said. The Hermiston office of the Employment Service is now providing facilities for the filing of unemployment compensation claims every Friday.

Since the opening of the Hermiston office, 11,165 men have been provided with jobs. Of those men, 5,241 were laborers and 1,798 were carpenters. A recent survey showed that of the men who had worked on the Umatilla Ordnance Depot, 3121 were from Oregon, 2623 were from Washington and 2290 were from Idaho and the remainder were scattered throughout the 48 states, with the dust bowl area well represented. Robbins said that in his opinion nearly every man eligible and qualified for work in the Hermiston area, and who wanted to work, had been

employed on the project. James Clinton has been placed in charge of the Hermiston office as acting manager, replacing Lynne M. Black, who was transferred to the Eugene office.
