### U. S. O. BUILDING COMPLETION SET CHRISTMAS EVE

The new U.S.O. building, which is being constructed at the Hermiston park, will be completed well before the deadline, Christmas eve, according to the foreman on the job. The building is well ahead of schedule.

Bricklayers are now busy on the huge fireplace and the heating equipment is being installed. Construction throughout is exceptionally strong. Work on the interior will go forward rapidly as quick as the crew of 12 to 18 men complete the work on the outside. The entire project will cost just a little over \$28,000, with the building taking approximately \$24,000 and the remainder to be spent on equipment and furnishings.

It is planned to dedicate the building Christmas eve when a national radio hookup will commemorate all the U.S.O. buildings in the United States.
