## FARM INCOME MAY RISE IN 1942 BUT COSTS ALSO MOUNT

Gross farm income in Oregon in 1942 should be materially above the 1941 level if present trends continue, although net income will not increase proportionately because of rising farm costs, according to an analysis made by the extension service at Oregon State college and published in the current agricultural situation and outlook report. Complete copies of the report may be had at any county extension office.

The demand outlook for farm products in 1942 is even better than in the exceptionally favorable year now ending. More business activity, a rising general price level, and increased demand for some products for exports all will play a part in the demand situation for next year, the report shows.

Further increase in domestic payrolls and military employment is expected to bring an increase in the per capita consumption of food. On the whole it is expected that national income in 1942 may exceed that of 1941 by 10 or 15 per cent. With the British government expecting to obtain about one-fourth of its food supplies from America next year, approximately 8 to 10 per cent of the farm production of the United States will be exported, or about twice the exports of 1941.

Advance estimates indicate that the 1941 gross farm income will exceed that of 1940 by about 25 per cent, making it the greatest since 1929. The increase in farm costs, however, is expected to be a little more in 1942 than it was in 1941. The average of 15 per cent increase this year was caused mostly by higher prices for labor, rent and feed. In 1942 the increases are expected to be felt in purchases of seed, automobiles and tractors, building materials, feed, containers, and other items of equipment and supplies.

The Oregon farm price index at mid-October showed the general level of farm prices at 94 per cent of the 1926-30 average, and 125 per cent of the 1910-14 figure.

with the assurance recently received that three top men of the U. S. department of agriculture, and possibly four, will attend the session, coming direct to Heppner from Washington, D. C.

The three men certain to attend are R. A. "Spike" Evans, national administrator of the AAA; N. E. Dodd, director of the western division of the AAA, and formerly chairman of the Oregon committee, and Leroy Smith, president of the Federal Crop Insurance corporation.

Long considered one of the most important meetings of wheat growers in the United States, the EOWL session has in recent years been made the occasion a number of times for important announcements of national farm policy related to this industry. Such is expected to be the case this time, as both Dodd and Evans are scheduled to deliver major addresses.

The annual banquet on Friday night will have as principal speaker Joseph K. Carson, civilian defense coordinator for the Pacific Coast, and department commander of the American Legion.

With prospects of a considerable number of wheat growers attending from neighboring states as well as from Oregon, the local entertainment committee is preparing adequate housing and meal service for all, according to reports obtained by S. J. Culley, Weston, president of the league.

### JOHN FREDERICK WURSTER

John Frederick Wurster, a pioneer Umatilla merchant, died at his home west of town early Friday morning following a stroke after the night's illness.

He was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, June 29, 1877, and came to this county about 35 years ago. He managed the local butcher shop until 1913 when he sold out and went to Florida where he married Mary Holder at Jacksonville, Fla., in 1916, and returned to Umatilla, managing a meat market until three years ago when he sold out to Milo McFarland, and retired on his farm.

Mr. Wurster was a long time member of the Masonic lodge and the funeral was held at Prann's Funeral parlors in Hermiston Monday at 2:00 o'clock, with the burial at the Hermiston cemetery.

Survivors are his widow, Mary Wurster, and daughters Sara and Mae Wurster, and Mrs. R. E. McNabb, two grandchildren, Diane and Freddie McNabb, three brothers, Walter and Albert of Cincinnati and George of Butter Creek.
