U.O.D. WATER TANK BECOMES LANDMARK

Reaching 130 feet skyward on sturdy legs, vividly painted with red and white checks and gayly bedecked with ornamental obstruction lights, the 150,000 gallon water tank of the Umatilla Ordnance Depot has become a new outstanding Eastern Oregon landmark.

West-bound travelers along transcontinental highway No. 30 first sight it as they top Rieth Ridge near Pendleton, more than 30 miles to the east, and it remains their marker until they dip into the Columbia River basin route west of Umatilla.

Nor is the water tower the only change in the Eastern Oregon landscape contributed by the 13 million dollar depot. Near its base, are a half dozen brick and tile permanent buildings; outside the administration, are a dozen steel and brick powder magazines, and, sprawled over 14 square miles of surrounding desert, are 1,000 concrete and steel igloos, blending harmoniously with sand and sage brush in which they are studied.

The igloos are not visible when the traveler first sights the vivid tower, but, as he swings nearer, topping each rolling hill, they enter his consciousness. At first they appear as tiny beehives, dotting the desert; a few hill tops later, they seem to become sand dunes, and, finally, he is aware of them as a tremendous monument to American preparedness.

Major Harry E. Schuppner announced this morning that the project is 92 per cent complete. The payroll of J. A. Terteling & Sons, contractors, has dwindled from 7,000 to less than 800, and Major Ralph Cook Scott, Ordnance Department, U. S. Army, has already established his headquarters and has employed a considerable portion of his "permanent party". Major Schuppner pointed out.

"All branches will be completed by January 21, completion date originally set for the project," Major Schuppner asserted.

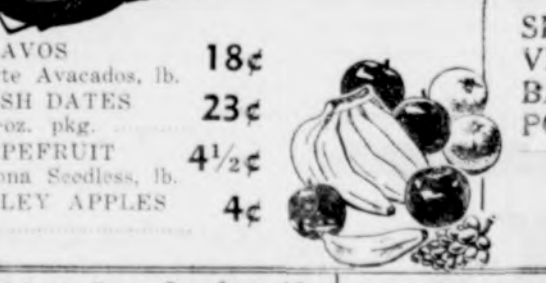
