man, N. R. Mueller and Chas. Hodge with each man naming a squad of four men. Country police will be R. H. Piersol, Lee Weber, H. H. Gailey, Glenn Ripley, A. H. Cable, Hal McCulley, Chas. Seeliger and C. A. Flinnigan. These men will each name six assistants. In this group mostly Legionaires were listed because of previous guard experience which will be a great advantage during war emergencies.

Organization of the fire auxiliary unit is described in another story on this page.

Vern Daugherty, chief of ordnance in civilian defense, is requesting that the public notify him of any pistols available of 32 calibre or larger. These pistols will receive good care and will be used for emergencies only.

Other branches of civilian defense will be organized as quickly as possible, according to Mr. Moore.

At the present time the main order for civilians is to remain in regular line of duty until requested to line up in one or another of the various divisions. There will be much work for everyone but organization details will take a little more time.

The biggest call at the present is to buy Defense Savings Bonds. These may be purchased in denominations of \$18.75, \$37.50 and \$75.00. At the end of 10 years these bonds will be worth, respectively \$25.00, \$50.00 and \$100.00, bearing an interest rate of almost 3%. Bonds may be purchased either at the post office or the First National Bank. Savings stamps may be purchased at the post office only.

UMATILLA YOUTHS WIN AT HEPPNER

Two Umatilla county boys, Phillip Hoon, Milton, and Harold Smith, Pilot Rock, were the exhibitors of the best pens of lambs fed in the contest sponsored by the Eastern Oregon Wheat League at Heppner, December 5 and 6. Glen Wilcox, of Hermiston, also exhibited a fine pen of lambs.

At the wheat league meeting these lambs were graded by R. L. Clark of the Bodine and Clark Commission Firm Portland, into three groups. The best group, or blue group, the red group and a green group.

These lambs were sold at Portland Monday to a San Francisco buyer and the blue group lambs topped the market at \$10.75 per hundred. The red group sold for \$9.85 and the green group lambs sold for \$9.00.

All the boys who fed these lambs were guests of the Eastern Oregon Wheat League, Portland Chamber of Commerce, and the Portland Union Stockyards on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. The boys were taken through Swift & Co. plant and shown slaughter operations from start to finish on all classes of livestock. ARMY ACTS QUICK AFTER WAR STRIKES

Mrs. Bob Woodward, Herald correspondent from the Columbia district, received a letter this week from her brother, Corporal Maurice E. Caldwell, stationed at Ft. Lewis, saying that five hours after word was received of the Japan attack on Pearl Harbor that the army was on guard duty at the Longview docks and bridge on the Columbia river.

This is an example as to how the army reacts to war news and what may be expected from our armed forces.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, a state of war has been declared to exist between the United States of America and the Japanese Empire; and

WHEREAS, the Oregon National Guard is in active Federal service; and

WHEREAS, it therefore becomes by duty as Chief Executive and Commander-in-Chief of the military forces of the State of Oregon to take such steps as may be necessary to safeguard the lives and property of the citizens of Oregon; and

WHEREAS, provision must be made for fixing responsibility for the coordination and the direction of the efforts of the military establishment, law enforcement machinery, and volunteer civilian defense organizations;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, CHARLES A. SPRAGUE, under the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Oregon and Director of Civilian Defense, declare an unlimited emergency to exist and

(1) Authorize and direct the voluntary enrollment of a State Guard pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 91, Oregon Laws 1941, and hereby appoint Brigadier General Alvin C. Baker commander thereof;

(2) Designate the Superintendent of State Police to coordinate, supervise and direct the activities of all regular peace and other law officers of this state in all matters and respects touching the needs and measures for state and civilian defense in cooperation with the armed forces of the United States;

(3) Authorize the State Defense Coordinator to direct and complete the voluntary civilian defense organizations of this state and to expedite the enrollment and training of personnel for civilian protection services.

(4) I hereby enjoin the people to comply promptly with directions of duly constituted military and civil authorities.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the State of Oregon to be affixed.

Done in the City of Salem this eighth day of December, in the year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and forty-one.
