FIRST BLACKOUT EXPERIENCED HERE

Hermiston had its first blackout Monday night from 11:00 p. m. till 6:30 a. m. All street lamps, neon signs and other lights about the city were turned out for the duration. Residents of the city were not informed of the plan as orders came late that evening from army headquarters in Seattle.

Art Thrasher, manager of the local office of P. P. & L. Co., explained Wednesday that during these blackouts power is not turned off. The blackouts are entirely voluntary and citizens are asked to cooperate by turning out all lights but electric power will remain in the lines. Some concern had been felt locally that all power would be turned off which would cause considerable difficulty.

in the field, and Dr. Belt employed one resident physician and one resident nurse for each of the three shifts.

Careful planning created the traffic regulations that governed more than 200 trucks and several hundred cars hustling about the project 24 hours daily, and Lt. McLeod reports that there was not one serious traffic accident involving injury to persons.

"There was a rise in accident frequency when we went on a 56-hour week basis, but, now that weekly hours have been reduced, there has been a sharp decline in minor accidents, and there have been no major accidents for some time," Lt. McLeod reported.

The history of construction projects indicates that accident frequency is highest on high speed jobs. However, on the Umatilla Ordnance Depot, the speed record for pouring igloos was doubled, while the low accident rate was being maintained.

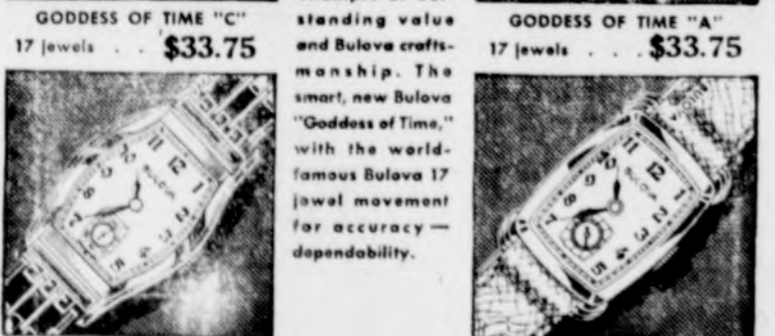
