H. K. Dean, in dealing with the necessities division, stated that the supply in both food and clothing was well taken care of here for the present. He has appointed Harry Connor in charge of the food supply; E. P. Dodd, housing and community facilities; Dr. Belt medical supplies. Mr. Dean further stated that an inventory of local clothing stores would also be made immediately.

Sam Moore, head of the protective division, told in detail the various agencies under his supervision. Chief of Police Dent heads the local police setup and has approximately 20 men in reserve. Rural guards have also been named, each man to name a group to assist him. Eight men who have been appointed by Mr. Moore are: Chas. Seeliger, C. A. Flanigan, H. G. McCulley, A. H. Cable, Glen Ripley, Russell Piersol, Lee Weber

Other men who have been named to head various groups and divisions are as follows: first aid, Julius Gimbel; telegraph, F. C. Woughter; transportation, O. O. Felthouse, publicity, The Herald.

Other points brought up during the meeting included the blackout last Sunday evening, blackout enforcement, blackout instructions and other details. It was stated that a lighted cigarette can be seen from a distance of 3000 feet and citizens were urged to cooperate in this respect.

Mayor F. C. McKenzie expressed the view that the city and the city council would do its part in cooperation in all the various divisions and would pass an ordinance dealing with infractions of rules set forth by defense heads.

Chairman Todd made a plea for the Red Cross which is making a second drive at this time.
