BRACHER AND HIATT ATTEND CIVILIAN PROTECTION SCHOOL

Paul A. Bracher and Ursel Hiatt of Umatilla attended a three-day school of civilian defense in Portland recently. The classes were under the auspices of the United States army, the office of civilian defense and the state defense council.

It was a very concentrated and enlightening session of classes from 8 a. m. to 10 p. m. each day. The sessions covered all phases of defense for the civilians. Those attending were to spread the word along in their own communities.

The school started with discussion of organizations of the various units from national units to local units and explaining the duties of each.

After organization was discussed at some length, Major W. A. Johnston, from the Edgewood Arsenal, with the chemical warfare division, took over the classes. Major Johnston and three other officers discussed the various phases of chemical warfare as to its effects on civilian life. The discussion was of the open forum type with questions always in order.

Poisonous gasses were discussed as to how used, effects and how to protect against it during war time Gasses are not apt to effect people of the interior but a knowledge of its odor effects and treatments should be encouraged.

Inciendary bombs were discussed as to types, sizes and number used. The types most used are small and more or less broadcast over wide areas. About one out of six bombs start fires and therefore each community should have auxiliary fire departments properly schooled in how to combat these fires that are likely to be started from these bombs during air raids.

High explosive bombs were also discussed as to size, types and effects. A very interesting demonstration was held for a select group on the last day of the session. It dealt primarily with incendiary bombs showing the actual combating of the various types of fires started with these bombs.

The main point stressed throughout the session was to BE PREPARED for the worst and then we will be prepared to cope with any situation that may arise.
