

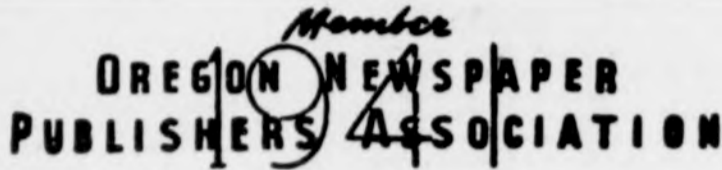

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DO NOT FORGET TO VOTE!

Saturday is the day to vote on the new water and sewer system. Too often in Hermiston good citizens forget to vote on important matters. They are either indifferent, or depend on their neighbors to perform that duty. Unless there is a real scrap of some kind, they forget or just stay at home, or go as usual about their business. The best interest any citizen can show in the growth and welfare of Hermiston is to become informed and vote.

We are in a war zone and defense area, and now have an opportunity to secure a grant of money without cost to the city, which we are never likely to have again.

The bonds will be service bonds, which again may not come our way when, should ge allow this opportunity to pass, we may be compelled to increase our water system and build a sewer at full cost with bonds on all property within the city limits.

We have been using cess pools, poorly constructed septic tanks and open toilets for over 30 years, and one of these days soon, with 100 per cent increase in population, there will come an end to such poor sanitary provisions. Should an epidemic come, the state health authorities will insist that we do what we are preparing to take time by the forelock, and do at a much lesser cost to property owners.

It is proposed to make use of the soft water in the artesian well. This is pure water and will save much in soap alone to the users. It is estimated that 50 per cent less soap will be used.

To date no objections have been made to a unanimous vote in favor of the bonds Saturday. A few have asked questions and these appeared reassured that it should be done. It is said that a strong favorable vote will encourage the government to more liberal grant of funds for the sewer, and any person here who investigates the whole matter cannot resist casting his vote favorably.

OREGON INCLUDED IN COTTON PROJECT

Oregon is among the states that will receive all of the materials for completing the cotton mattress and comforter program as originally planned. Present reports indicate that to date 8,724 mattresses and 1,916 cotton comforters have been made in this state-wide program. This accomplishment is the result of the efforts of 5,840 Oregon families and represents a savings to those families of approximately \$213,356.00.

This program has been made possible through the cooperation of the Surplus Marketing Administration which supplied the 50 pounds of cotton and 10 yards of ticking for each mattress and also four pounds of cotton and 10 yards of percale for each comforter to families that could qualify under this program. AAA has cooperated by handling the orders, certifying the applicants, and helping with the transportation of materials from the southern states to counties participating.

The Oregon State Extension Service has provided the leadership in teaching the skills involved in making the mattresses and comforters and county workers have supervised the local programs. Much credit is due the volunteer leaders throughout the state who gave their time and effort in order that neighbors and friends might have bedding that they otherwise could not have provided.

In Oregon the program is only half completed. The delay is the result of inability to get ticking and percale because the needs of the defense program had to be considered first. The news that ordered materials will be supplied, however, assures the completion of the project in the spring and summer or as soon as dry weather is assured.

PHONE COMPANY TO ISSUE BONDS

The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company is being empowered by the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco to act as an issuing agent for U. S. defense bonds being purchased by its employees under the payroll allotment plan, according to word received by R. V. McGee, acting manager here.

In an official announcement, N. R. Powley, president of the company, said:

"Our resources, facilities and personnel are all directed toward our company playing its full, effective and patriotic part in this great national emergency. We count it not only a real privilege, but also an honor to be of service to our government in acting as its issuing agent for the United States defense savings bonds. Further, this arrangement we are placing in effect — and the same is true of all large employers who become an issuing agent — will lighten the load of the Federal Reserve Banks and other selling agents who have been swamped with orders.
