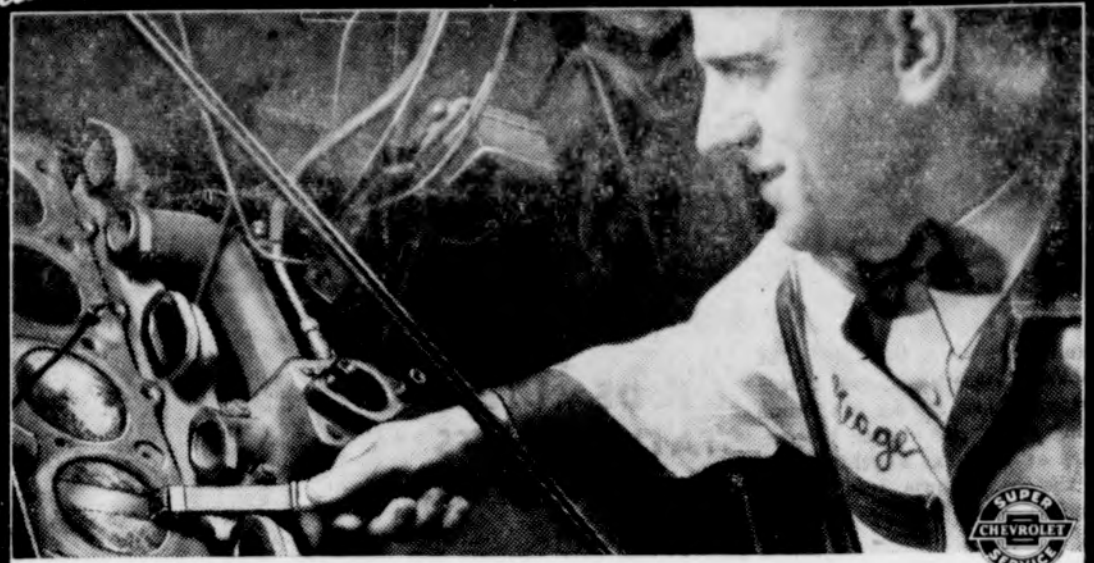

CROP PROSPECTS DISCUSSED

years, and because of seed from volunteer plants that shatter and reseed. This crop could probably be grown in most of the district at a profit since the government is now guaranteeing 10 cents a pound for the seed. The problem of harvesting machinery is very important with this crop and, according to Mr. Jenkins, could not be obtained for this district since priorities for the machinery are based on the amount of machinery sold in a district the preceding year.

The growing of sugar beets was discussed and according to the opinion of those present and Mr. Jenkins, this crop could be grown successfully most any place on the project. The problem of marketing the sugar beets, obtaining seed, and the labor shortage may be the limiting factors in regard to this crop. It was pointed out that sugar beets grown in this area may be marketed at Toppenish, Washington.

Colored slides of legume seed crops and grass seed crops in other areas of Oregon were shown by Mr. Jenkins, and gave a discussion of these that was of considerable interest to the groups.

Mr. Jenkins pointed out that pasture renovation unless done very thoroughly may result in a waste of seed. He recommended that the pasture be torn up by cross cultivating and then the new pasture seed planted and the ground packed or rolled.

Mr. Jenkins gave a discussion of Birdsfoot clover, which is a new pasture crop that many of the farmers have been hearing about. It was their opinion that this Birdsfoot clover may be successfully used in this area in pastures that were only slightly alkaline and that were now planted to Strawberry clover. This crop is supposed to be a heavier forage yielder than the Strawberry clover.

The assistant county agent, Gene Lear, urged those attending the meetings to cooperate with the bond pledge drive that is now being conducted, and many of those attending the meetings signed these pledges, if they had not already done so. Those attending were urged to turn in their scrap iron as soon as they could conveniently do so.

Kenneth Gray, entomologist, Oregon State college, was also present at these meetings and gave information to those present relative to insect and pest control.
