REGISTRATION FOR MIDDLE AGED SET FOR FEB. 15 & 16

According to the new law passed by Congress, the third registration under the Selective Training and Service Act of 1940 shall take place February 16, 1942. The President's proclamation follows:

"Every male citizen of the U. S., and every other male person residing in the continental United States or in the Territory of Alaska or in the Territory of Hawaii or in Puerto Rico, other than persons excepted by section 5 (a) of the Selective Training and Service Act of 1940, as amended, and by section 208 of the Coast Guard Auxiliary and Reserve Act of 1941, is required to and shall on February 16, 1942, present himself for and submit to registration before a duly designated registration official or selective service local board having jurisdiction in the area in which he has his permanent home or in which he may happen to be on that day if such male citizen or other male person on December 31, 1941, has attained the twentieth anniversary of the day of his birth and on February 16, 1942, has not attained the forty-fifth anniversary of the day of his birth, and has not heretofore been registered under the Selective Training and Service Act of 1940 and the regulations thereunder: Provided, that the duty of any person to present himself for and submit to registration in accordance with any previous proclamation issued under said Act shall not be affected by this proclamation."

An all day registration will be in progress at Pendleton Sunday, February 15, and Monday, February 16, from 8:00 a. m. to 9:00 p. m. at the selective service office. Registration will be open at the Stanfield Irrigation District office Monday from 8:00 a. m. to 9:00 p. m. Registration will also be Monday at Milton and at the Mission Indian agency. There will be no place of registration in Hermiston.

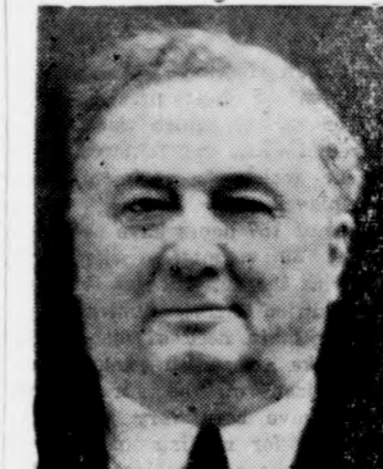
FARM SECURITY PLANS FOR YEAR

A group meeting of the Farm Security Administration Borrowers was held last Thursday at the Columbia park hall. An election of officers was held during the evening with the following being named: Chairman, Guy Knapp; vice chairman, Vic Addleman, and secretary, Mabel Corliss.

Topics discussed during the evening included: A cooperative medical association whereby, for a certain specified fee annually, everyone would have required medical care; a veterinary and dental association, the need for which is great as there is no veterinarian in the surrounding territory; diversified farming and new crops which can be raised here; cooperative purchasing of machinery and breeding stock; re-financing of Westland Irrigation district, and gardens and food preservation.

The new organization will be known as the Farm Security Cooperative association. Mr. Bennett, F.S.A. supervisor, discussed new food for the victory program and how this organization can help all farmers interested.
